Distinguished English visitors to the A.L.R.C. during the quarter included The Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Megarry, Vice-Chancellor in the High Court of Justice. Sir Robert delighted legal audiences with more of his "judicial temptations". See [1979] Reform 17. Four members of the English Royal Commission on Criminal Procedure visited the A.L.R.C. in September. They included Lord Justice Eveleigh and Mr. W. A. B. Forbes, Q.C. (Law Commissioner). Mr. Forbes spent some time in Sydney and Melbourne discussing local police and prosecution practices with appropriate authorities. In Sydney, Mr. Forbes delivered a spirited lecture at the Sydney Law School on the topic "The Stresses and Strains of Law Reform" (5 September).

■ A "must" for all bodies interested in law reform is the recent publication by Professional Books of London of Donald Raistrick's *Law Commission Digest*. The Digest contained, in the words of Law Commission Chairman, Sir Michael Kerr, "a comprehensive summary of the whole of the Law Commission's work . . . giving a bird's-eye view of everything which the Commission has achieved during the first thirteen years." ■ The A.L.R.C. Report on *Human Tissue Transplants* continues to be studied for implementation in the States. It was referred by the Standing Committee of Attorneys-General to the State Ministers of Health. The Victorian Minister of Health has told Parliament that his Ministry "is to a large extent favourably disposed towards the proposed legislation". A Working Party has been set up, chaired by Mr. H. W. Pascoe, S.M. Announcement that the report will be implemented in Queensland gives a spur to the hope for uniform laws on this topic.
