Why seek research from law reform agencies when there are universities geared for that purpose with eager young academics panting for a doctoral thesis? How valuable to a busy Cabinet is a report that grapples (in several hundred pages) with the recondite and the esoteric? Are there not wise persons in the Attorney-General's Department who can be marshalled precisely to determine what (if any) legislation should be applied to which (of many) circumstances? Does not the thesis and antithesis of parliamentary debate itself produce a synthesis which, with the aid of the parliamentary draftsman, can be translated into effective legislation without

sifting through a law reform agency?

There are effective, conclusive and complete answers to these and any other questions the cynics may wish to ask. We, of the Northern Territory Law Reform Committee, invite you to join with us in answering them. Of course, you are also welcome to raise other topics. We expect lively debates.
