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
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Aboriginal centre: help sought

The National Aboriginal Youth Law Centre is seeking Law Society members to contribute to the centre's activities.

Director Margeret Friel said a register of volunteers and legal expertise would be important support mechanisms for the centre's operation.

Funded by the Australian Youth Foundation and the NT University, the centre opened in April this year.

It is a project of the Aboriginal Legal Services of the NT, NT University and the Law School of Flinders University, South Australia.

"The centre has been established to promote the legal rights of Aboriginal children and young people," Margeret said.

"Our activities will be directed at using and improving the law, legal systems and legal services for the advancement of the rights of young Aboriginal people."

Specific activities of the centre include:

- monitoring the implementation of recommendations of the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Deaths in Custody;
- monitoring the implementation of principles of the International Convention on the Rights of the Child;
- the provision of legal education to Aboriginal youth;
- the provision of an information service and undertaking original research and;
- the provision of assistance with litigation and/or litigation.
