

BP Plus card goes to work

BP and The Law Society are working together to offer you lower priced petrol and the ultimate in convenience.

Better pricing, various card options, the availability of information on fuel consumption and BP's Direct Debit System make it popular with members.

Several members have already taken advantage of the services made available by BP and now enjoy a lower price for fuel. Members are automatically charged the best price at time of purchase. This is the lower price between the BP Card Price, minus a rebate, and the pump price at the point of sale.

The BP Card Price is based on the average pump price of BP sites in the pricing zone (metropolitan or country) in each state or territory. Your Law Society also receives a benefit every time a member uses the BP Plus Card.

BP cards can either be vehicle specific or personalised with a driver's name printed on the card. (Personalised cards come with a PIN number.) Purchase options are: Clean and Go car wash; tyres, batteries and parts; services and repairs; and the BP Shop.

Additionally, BP's recently introduced Extended Merchant Network enables cardholders the convenience of using one BP Plus card for all vehicle-related needs such as windscreens, tyres and mufflers, etc. This gives you the benefit of having all your vehicle maintenance costs appearing on one report and having only one payment to make. Goodyear Tyres/McCleod Tyres, Windscreens O'Brien and Beaurepaires now all accept BP Plus cards for payment.

There is no need to remember dates for payment. By way of BP's Direct Debit System, payment of members' accounts is easy. Payment of the BP Plus Account is made on the 21st of the month. Banks handle the transactions automatically. There are no surcharges or account fees, simply a 25 cent transaction fee every time the card is used.



The vineyards at Seppeltsfield were the genesis of the Seppelt business.

The company once had large holdings in the Barossa Valley. Since the early 1960s the company has moved to other areas for specialised grape supply.

The Barossa vineyards now centre on Seppeltsfield and produce grapes for premium sherries and ports. There is also a small (seven hectare) vineyard at Dorrien which produces excellent cabernet sauvignon.

Seppelt's Dorrien vineyard is one of the company's few remaining sources of premium wine grape in the Barossa Valley. Seppelt has moved to other areas such as Padthaway, Drumborg and the Adelaide Hills in its quest for premium grapes.

Dorrien's vines are all cabernet sauvignon — some of them very old. Dorrien Cabernet Sauvignon is significantly different from the usual Barossa cabernet.

The wine has greater intensity of flavour and depth of character. The soil is very good and the vines are only watered when necessary to prevent water stress

Even so, the fruit is only good enough to produce a wine worthy of release as a "Dorrien Cabernet" every second year on average.

At the end of the Sydney Royal Wine Show, the most successful wines of major shows of the previous 12 months are brought together and judged by the Chairman of Judges of all those shows to select the "Champion of Champions" which is then awarded the prestigious Tucker Seabrook Caon Trophy.

The just released, 1990 Seppelt Dorrien Cabernet won the Tucker Seabrook Caon Perpetual Trophy at the 1995 Sydney Royal Wine Show.

Winemaker Ian McKenzie said: "Dorrien Cabernet is a unique single vineyard wine and is the flagship of the Seppelt red wine range. The wine is deep purple red in colour. It has lush berry fruit aroma of ripe Cabernet. Densely structured, the wine is rich and complex. French and American oak and bottle age combine to give great cedary complexity.

"Destined to be a classic from an outstanding vintage, the depth of flavour, structure and balance guarantees a wine of pedigree which will live for many years, yet can be enjoyed now with hearty beef or game dishes." Seppelt Dorrien Cabernet Sauvignon 1990 is our members' special this month at \$25 a bottle.
