

NTU Law Faculty - Double the Satisfaction

The Northern Territory University's Law Faculty has one of the highest satisfaction ratings in the country, according to a prestigious graduate national survey.

The Graduate Careers Council of Australia rates NTU Law as having the equal second highest graduate satisfaction rating. NTU's score is more than double the national average.

The survey also reveals that more than 95% of NTU Law Faculty graduates are employed and a significant number are in other full time study.

Dean of the NTU's Faculty of Law, Jenny Blokland, recently released details of the widely circulated survey and confirmed that the Law Faculty is committed to a very high standard of teaching, offering a diverse and stimulating learning environment.

"Because the Faculty is so small and the local legal profession is extremely supportive we offer students a high level of support and development of both practical and theoretical skills".

NTU Law Faculty is becoming well-known in the areas of South East Asian law and indigenous peoples and the law.

Jenny Blokland, in drawing the attention of the Law Society to the survey, paid tribute to members of the profession, judiciary and general community who have given their support to the law school in its first decade.

"We believe the legal community of the Territory should share in this recent indication of success," said Ms Blokland.

"I trust we will enjoy your continued support in the ever changing higher education environment and that studying law will continue to be a satisfying and stimulating pursuit."

The NTU Law School's rating is equalled by that of Flinders University and topped by Bond University. Following close behind is the University of Wollongong.

Low scorers in the survey, conducted by the Australian Council for Educational Research, include James Cook University, Queensland University and the University of Sydney. The Australian National University and Macquarie University in NSW both scored the national mean.
