
PEOPLE AND THE LAW

Who are your role models and why? Nelson Mandela, Mahatma Gandhi and the Dalai Lama, for obvious reasons. None in the law (yet), sorry!


Your favourite place in the NT? Casuarina beach for the endless sand, sea and sky.


Your favourite place in the NT and why: Mangrove swamps around Darwin. No-one ever goes there and its like being on a different planet.
