LAWASIA and the Law Society (NT) will be hosting the *Media and the Law* conference in Alice Springs, 13–15 May.



## East Timor Coordination Symposium strikes interest from local legal eagles

Coordinating the effort of various legal bodies and firms aiming to help the development of an East Timorese justice system was the focus recently of a two day symposium in Darwin.

The need for a coordination symposium grew from the Darwin Community Legal Service's experiences while organising a project to support the development of small community based legal and advocacy organisations in East Timor.

The aim of the symposium (held in early March), was to secure firm commitments

from Australian bodies for ongoing pro bono assistance to East Timor NGOs and to develop a process by which the reponse of the Australian legal community can be better coordinated.

The attendance to the symposium was solid with attendees including the ALAF, HREOC and AIJA as well as

representatives from the East Timorese judiciary.

A range of legal aid and advocacy organisations also travelled to Darwin to attend.
