Earn CPD Points as a Balance Author

Become a Balance author and earn your CPD points

Practitioners can earn up to six CPD points per CPD year simply by writing a legal article and having it published in *Balance*.

Below are key critera for earning CPD points as a Balance author.

- For each 1000 words of a published legal article or work in a recognised legal publication or other
 quality non-legal publication, structural editing of legal material and the refereeing of a legal article
 1 CPD point.
- CPD points may not be claimed in respect of a publication that deals with substantially the same content as a presentation for which CPD points have been claimed.
- A maximum of six CPD points may be claimed under this category.
