As we all know, the incarceration rates for Aboriginal people in the NT are appalling. Rates of offending and recidivism are high. The level of disadvantage experienced by Aboriginal people in the NT, indeed across Australia, are unacceptable. There is no denying that the complex problems faced by many Aboriginal Territorians contribute to such poor justice outcomes. Despite many years of trying, the current and previous approaches have not improved the situation. The Aboriginal Justice Agreement represents a new and holistic approach.

Consultation with the whole community is currently underway to help develop the Agreement and the steering committee is seeking input from the legal profession as part of this consultation process. NTWLA is committed to addressing disadvantage and discrimination across the justice system, and many of our members are well-positioned to offer input. NTWLA will be offering members an opportunity to do this at a consultation session for members later in the year or early next year. I look forward to seeing you there.
