The Hon P de Jersey AC, Chief Justice

Your Excellency, Professor Lavarch, Mr Laurie, ladies and gentlemen...

I am very pleased the Convention is again being held at the Supreme Court, and I am delighted to welcome you all to the Banco Court, especially of course Her Excellency the Governor.

While momentous work is regularly accomplished in this courtroom of such grand proportions, I may be pardoned, I think, for expressing some reservation about the fabric – the excellent portraiture aside. But today you students will I am confident inject a vibrancy which will obliterate any misgiving about our precious orange colourings.

As I mentioned, momentous judicial work is regularly carried out in this courtroom. As recent examples, the trial of Mr Long in relation to the Childers backpacker fire proceeded here, as did the appeal which led to Ms Hanson's release from custody. Today the courtroom will experience a rather different debate.

The judiciary jealously protects its basic separation from the executive arm of government. I expect that will emerge today in your consideration of the executive role. I must say I agree with the implicit view of those who framed the theme of this year's convention: I suspect most Australians' appreciation of the executive is rather scant – its composition, its powers, how it operates; yet its power is immense. Indeed, governments have been criticized for dispatching too much governing by means of the executive. Certainly less can be known of the detail of <u>its</u> work, than characterizes the legislative branch of government, not to overlook the judicial arm which works under the continual potential of the glare of publicity.
