It is therefore appropriate that it be introduced in a Court which prides itself on innovation not only in the use of technology but in the area of therapeutic jurisprudence. The innovative use of technology is evident from the moment you enter this building by walking past the electronic notice boards and continues through the video conferencing technology used in our Court rooms, and increasingly to link our Courts with each other and with other facilities throughout Queensland.

OZCASE will enhance the on-line research capacity of our Court as it operates in over 100 centres throughout this geographically vast and decentralised state.

Further as our Court embarks on the development of a history of the Magistracy and a complimentary public display within this building, it is appropriate that today we can also celebrate the completion of the digitisation of the Sir Samuel Griffith Criminal Code and the explanatory and extrinsic materials that relate to it. We also look forward to the Crown Law sponsored project to digitise other historical legislative material.

As Ms Crawford has said, the sharing of this information about the collections of the participating libraries will place anyone wanting access to it in a better position to do so.

I therefore have much pleasure in launching the OZCASE Queensland Historical Legal Collection by cutting the virtual ribbon and inviting you to view the homepage which will now be activated.
