Income tax

IT appears that members attending the Christchurch Conference will be able to claim income tax deductions.

The LAA wrote to the office of the Commissioner of Taxation seeking amplification of the taxation provisions which cover attendance at professional conferences.

The Taxation Office has replied, stating ... it is accepted as a general principle that a taxpayer engaged in a professional or skilled occupation is entitled to an income tax deduction in respect of expenditure which he incurs for the purpose of maintaining or increasing his knowledge or ability in that particular profession or occupation, provided, of course, it is not of a private, domestic or capital nature. Expenses incurred by a taxpayer attending the Association's conference could, therefore, be deductible. It would not, however, be conceded that costs that relate to any part of his family accompanying him would be allowable. In addition, any part of the total expenditure which is attributable to private activities such as sightseeing and social gatherings, would be regarded as private expenditure and accordingly not an allowable deduction . .

The Commissioner advises further that any claims for deductions will be considered on an individual basis, taking into account the nature and extent of the actual expenditure, considered in the light of the information

supplied with the individual's income tax return.

So, keep all those receipts. This will enable you to detail your expenditure in your next income tax return.

Public Service Board says Christchurch is not 'overseas'

THERE'S good news for Commonwealth Public Servants. The Public Service Board has advised that Christchurch as a conference location is just like attending a conference in Adelaide or Brisbane. The Board does not see attendance at the LAA21 Conference as being an 'overseas visit'.

If the Department's travel vote can afford the cost of the ticket there is no impediment in sending the departmental librarian to Christchurch.

As a matter of interest, Papua New Guinea and New Zealand are treated in this fashion by the Commonwealth Public Service Board.

The Conference fee will be NZ\$65, which converts to approximately AUS\$56 – not \$75 as stated previously. The actual registration fee payable will be determined by the exchange rate applicable at the time of registration.

One in the 'Bush'...Two in the Library

INCE DARWIN's new Public Library at Casuarina opened on 12 February this year, the Library has enrolled 8000 members and by the end of April had loaned 59,418 books.

Librarian Bruce Turner says the Library has been an 'overwhelming success showing that "Top End" residents are not just interested in drinking beer and going "Bush".'

Since opening, the Library has received a large and increasing demand for inter-library loans.

A vigorous and well organised program of school visits to the Library has been organised

by Cathy Flint, Children's Librarian (formerly of Carringbush, Melbourne) so that many thousands of Darwin children have had their first experience of modern public library service.

Things are looking up on the public library scene in the Territory. Ron Davis (formerly Assistant State Librarian in WA) was appointed Director of Library Services, NT, early this year; a new public library will open at Alice Springs in the next few months, and other new libraries throughout the Territory will open soon.

The Northern Territory Library Service will soon commence the training of Aboriginal Library Assistants in several libraries in the Territory.
