THE Commonwealth Agricultural Bureau is now represented in Australia by the CSIRO. George Levick (CSIRO, Melbourne) will conduct training sessions on request, and CAB documentation is available from CSIRO Central Information, Library and Editorial Section. Two training courses were conducted during February for new AUSINET participants.

At a course arranged by the NSW Branch of the LAA's Information Science Section, 12 AUSINET operators from 10 participating institutions in NSW were trained at a three-day course 13-15 February. Co-ordinators and tutors for the course came from the State Library of NSW, The University of Sydney, the University of NSW and the National Library of Australia.

AUSINET intends to use computer-assisted instruction to supplement AUSINET training in the future, and a suite of learning packages on various aspects of AUSINET will be written later this year. There are several new databases available on AUSINET - ISI's Arts and Humanities Citation Index covering 1979 material has been available since October 1979. ACI expect to mount the LASORS (Literature Analysis System - Office of Road Safety) database on a trial basis shortly, and the AESIS (Australian Earth Sciences Information Service) database will follow.

AUSINET users are now able to search databases offline through the . . . SEARCH-OFF command. This allows a profile to be entered online during the day, to be saved and then processed that evening against a database not available during normal operating hours that day.

Another enhancement to AUSINET has been the introduction of the . . . SPEC command which allows users to input their individual print specification for each database. Dial-up users are now accessing AUSINET through MICOM, an 'intelligent port selector' which controls and co-ordinates terminal access to the computer facility. MICOM has message-switching capacity and ACI will pursue this aspect with Telecom.

The *AUSINET user manual* is now available from the National Library of Australia. Documentation for both ATMS and GDE, and guides for APAIS and SSCI databases are packaged in three ring binders. The documentation for STAIRS (which will be published mid-year) and other database guides will be sent as they become available to all purchasers of the manual. The manual is available for \$14.00 (including postage) from Sales and Subscription Unit National Library of Australia.

In a recent column there was a list some of the database vendors who had responded to the NSW Online Users Group's call for help. Since then, some more information has been received:

Lesle Symes, representing the Institute for Scientific Information, sent a copy of their invaluable *User's Guide to Online Searching of Scisearch and Social Scisearch*. She also men-

tioned that in addition to this there are lists of publications covered in the ISI databases, descriptive literature and slides on the structure and use of the hard copy versions of the various indexes.

SWINBURNE College of Technology has produced a COM-fiche catalogue entitled *National Union Catalogue of Audiovisual Materials*. From September this year a separate listing of AV materials produced in universities and CAEs will be included.

School of Librarianship to remain in Hobart

FEARS THAT the School of Librarianship at the Tasmanian College of Advanced Education would be transferred to the Newnham campus at Launceston were put to rest by a recent decision of the Tasmanian Council of Advanced Education and the Tertiary Education Commission of Tasmania.

On 30 April 1980 the Council agreed to the transfer of the School to the University of Tasmania. This decision was endorsed by the Commission on the same day.

The LAA had made strong representations to the Minister, Mr Holgate, that the School should remain in Hobart. In doing so, it added to opinions expressed by staff at the School, who believed moving it to Launceston would seriously jeopardise the future of courses offered by the School.
