Obituary

BILL CHAPE, formerly City Librarian of Perth, died suddenly of a heart attack on Saturday, 3 November 1979.

This is a personal recollection because I, like many librarians and others, held Bill in a great deal of affection and respect. For 20 years until his retirement he was the 'father' of the public librarians working in Western Australia: by age, by experience, by his willingness to support and advise his younger colleagues.

Bill Chape had a long and varied career. He entered librarianship in the Depression years of the 1930s working in what was still the pioneer era in county libraries in Britain. As a master raconteur, Bill told some of his best stories about early days in British public libraries: about poverty-stricken junior assistants, about his first Library Association Conference with august Chief Librarians in top hats and tails, about pet lambs leaving their mark inside mobile libraries, about dedicated librarians who could say (and mean it) 'we have the best job in the world, Mr Chape: we have books and we have people'.

Bill developed an early passion for flying, joining the RAF Volunteer Reserve and being trained as a pilot before World War II. Again, more stories about the difficulties he had persuading selectors that with a 5'3" body and short legs he could pilot a Wellington Bomber (with a thick cushion behind!), about flying the North Atlantic for five years with Coastal Command, about the year of trying to fly aircraft fitted with strange experimental devices for the Boffins at Malvern.

He finished the war as a Squadron Leader, had meanwhile married Beatrice (Beattie), who was a WAAF equipment assistant, and they found that going back to the Cumberland County library was just too mundane. So they headed for the tropics, Bill spending periods of employment in Buenos Aires with the British Council Library, in Jamaica with the Carribbean Library Service.

Then Bill was appointed by F.A. Sharr as the first Circulation Librarian with the fledgling Library Service of Western Australia, joining the little band of pioneers at 11 Havelock Street in Perth. As a Yorkshireman, he was a little out of place in a group which became known throughout Australia as 'little Manchester', but this was not his reason for

later accepting an appointment as the first City Librarian of Perth.

More pioneering: converting the old Perth Literary Institute into a City Library, then planning and seeing into construction the present service of Central Library and three branch libraries, all in rapid succession. Bill was justifiably proud of the fact that Perth was the first capital City Council in Australia to plan and build a Central Library in the city block.

After all this pioneering life Bill slowed down in later years — and why not? He had achieved a great deal, but all public librarians will agree that there is a constant and heavy demand on one's energy and enthusiasm to maintain support for the library service from those holding the purse-strings, and it is the exceptional person who does not run out of steam by retirement. As a former public librarian I found Bill full of mental energy and ideas to the end, and will particularly treasure the several LAA conferences which we shared.

After our first Conference, Bill and I spent a week visiting Victorian public libraries. I drove, we covered 2000 miles. Bill told marvellous stories for the whole distance, and never repeated himself. I'm certain that since 3 November, work has ground to a halt in Heaven while Bill re-tells all his stories!
