SHOWPIECE FOR TAFE

SYDNEY Technical College Library, the Central library of the NSW Department of Technical and Further Education, is at ast to have a permanent home at the centre of he College's main Ultimo campus.

After 18 years in an old department store uilding, the library is due to move into a new surpose-built Library Resource Centre (LRC) n the latter half of 1982.


The picture shows the complete building which will be finished in two stages. The LRC ccupies the first two and a half levels and is low under construction at a cost of \$6.5m. The upper teaching levels will be added later.

Sydney Technical College, with an enrolnent of 37,384 (15,500 EFT), is by far the argest TAFE college in Australia. Its LRC erves not only the large campus population out also the 20,000 external students of the Department, and supplements the resources and services at 83 colleges throughout NSW. Planning for the new building had to take account of both the campus needs and the entral role.

The LRC will have a gross floor area of 7000 quare metres and will be fully air-condiioned and built for maximum flexibility in ayout. It is designed to house a collection of 50,000 print volumes and 100,000 audioviual items, and will have formal study seating or 550 readers as well as a number of informal eading areas and special purpose areas.

About 1000 square metres have been allocated for AV services, including powered arrels, music listening area, recording and riewing rooms and workrooms for minor roduction. The LRC will also include six eminar/conference rooms and four small group study rooms, as well as closed terraces and a roof garden.

The Library has a staff of 38 (17 profesional, 13 para-professional and eight support taff) to provide service to the college students nd teachers and to perform its functions as he central library of the TAFE network. Its nain emphasis is on reader services, as the cquisition and cataloguing of materials is arried out centrally by the Division of library Services.

To meet the diverse and special needs of students and teachers, and to promote their use of libraries, a detailed reader education program is carried out. Of particular interest to TAFE students is the AV collection, which is a major growth area in the library.

The collection at 31 October 1980, was 187,000 print volumes, 12,000 AV items and 3000 serial subscriptions. The allocation for 1981 was \$220,500.

Although it is the largest library in TAFE, Sydney Technical College is only one of the network of 52 TAFE libraries in NSW. The state-wide library network of the NSW Department of Technical and Further Education is administered centrally through the Department's Division of Library Services. The Division has an administrative unit which co-ordinates the Department's library services throughout the State.

The prime aim of the Department's 52 libraries is to make an effective contribution to all aspects of the Department's work. This includes administration, course development,

teacher education, teaching, learning, staff development and research.

The aim is also to make adequate provision for independent and self-paced learning, and to educate students in the efficient use of libraries and sources of information so that they are equipped to find information after completion of their college course.

TAFE is an expanding organisation, continually responding to community needs. In concert with this expansion there has been a dramatic growth in the number of TAFE libraries.

During the past five years, 17 new libraries have been established and there has been a 60 percent increase in the numbers of professional and para-professional staff. At present, TAFE library services has 245 employees of whom approximately 200 are librarians and library officers.

TAFE is the most diverse sector of postsecondary education, and its library services must continually respond to the changing learning/teaching needs of over a quarter of a million students and teachers in NSW.
