Introduction to corporate management

THE NSW Local Government and Shires Association have recently published a manual on corporate management Introduction to corporate management, management manual 1.

The manual was compiled by a Working Party made up of representatives of the five professional bodies whose members make up local government departmental top and middle management (ie clerks, engineers, health surveyors, librarians and town planners); the Local Government Department; elected members of Council; and the Associations Management Services Division.

It is the first of a series of manuals on various aspects of corporate management in NSW and work has already begun on the second manual – Financial Management.

Introduction to corporate management is a substantial loose-leaf volume which will be continually updated by a special annual subscription service. It costs \$60.50.

Included in the manual and also available separately is a bibliography on corporate management of some 29 items. The contents of this bibliography were selected by the Management Services Division's staff and it was annotated and arranged by the LAA NSW Branch representatives on the Working Party: Diana Oliver (Sutherland Shire Council) and Bernard Sargeant (Public Libraries Division, State Library). Other librarians in local government involved included Alan Flores (Penrith), Julia Browne (Hawkesbury) and Chris Williams (Lake Macquarie) who is also currently the Branch's representative on the second manual Financial Management.



Librarians and child care

On Tuesday, 19 May the Reference Interest Group Victoria sponsored a meeting of Melbourne librarians working in the field of child

During the half day meeting several librarians distributed copies of child care serial holdings, and the Dept of Community Welfare Services library distributed a list of reference sources in child care. Since the holdings of most of the libraries are not included in NUCOM, SALSSAH or SSAL, the information proved most useful.

A discussion on 'Progress and problems' highlighted several points on the literature of child care. There is no single adequate child care data base currently available, although there are several bases which include some useful literature. There is one highly specialised data base, Child abuse and neglect, suitable for literature searches on overseas material. There have been a number of new monographs on child care issues in Australia, so that a body of literature is beginning to develop.

Child care is an interdisciplinary study and the librarians present showed this in discussing their libraries' holdings. Psychology, sociology, social welfare, education, medicine and literature were the main areas listed. Because each of the libraries also had responsibilities other than child care, it was obvious that interlibrary co-operation has to be developed and fostered. Neil P. Donahoo


