An Australian talking typewriter

By internally modifying a normal IBM Selectric typewriter, Prof Ron Aitchison and Terry Brown of Macquarie University have developed an economical strategy for having the machine announce the names of letters which it types. The typewriter can also read back a line of type, a character at a time, by calling on an inbuilt memory. Other facilities offered include announcements of function operations (space, capital, etc) and corrections of identified misspellings. The purpose of the machine is to give greater independence to print-handicapped people, and hopefully to open up hitherto impossible employment prospects.

Library services in Canada

Commanding language

The concept of giving spoken instructions to machines has been popularised by science fiction. At present some computers do have limited voice recognition systems. The systems are crude in that individual words must be spoken in isolation. IBM report some success in recognition of continuous speech and transcription into printed form. Currently it takes the computer around two and a half hours to transcribe a one-minute spoken passage with high accuracy.

School by satellite
