ACT SPECIALS

ON 27 March the Section will hold a one-day seminar in the CSIRO Headquarters Conference Room, Limestone Ave. The seminar will address the problems of automated union catalogues and NUCOM.

Increased demands for timely information and the use of online searching are pressuring specials into speedier document backup. Financial constraints mean that the self-contained library is not possible. Indications are that special library resources should be recognised as a vital part of the national information resource.

The seminar will look at automated systems that can be used as union catalogues, other uses of automation to speed the service and NUCOM itself. Aimed at librarians who will be involved in improving the speed and efficiency of document delivery services. Contact Janet Smith (062) 45 2116.

WA INFORMATION SCIENCE SECTION

JOHN HILLER took time out of a busy schedule during a recent visit to Perth to talk to members of the ISS (WA Group) on the use of statistics in library management.

The talk focused on the use of data generated by automated circulation systems in academic libraries. The data gathered should identify problem areas. It is then necessary to determine whether any of these are worth further investigation. If so, it may be necessary to supplement statistics from the automated system with manually collected data, if this is possible.

The information collected could be used for a variety of purposes, including: general collection building, the selection of stock for transfer or retirement, the revision of loan periods, etc.

While the identification of borrowers can be withheld, it is possible, as an off-shoot, for conflicts between assignments set by different faculties, and the teaching patterns of staff to be revealed by such analyses. While this is useful information to the librarian in managing his collection, it may disturb academic staff and the librarian needs to be careful.
