THE LAA IS concerned to maintain a watching brief on the possible effects on libraries and library staff of the 'rationalisation of colleges of advanced education', proposed by the Review of Commonwealth Functions (Razor Gang).

Amalgamations are now under way and a number of areas of concern are beginning to emerge. To enable the Association to take any informed action that might be required on behalf of the profession, we are trying to build up a profile of the effects of the amalgamations.

If any of the amalgamations are likely to result in infringements to the standard of library services, the standard of librarianship, or the status of the profession, it would be appreciated if this information could be sent to the Executive Director.

SALES TAX WIN!

ON 10 MARCH the Senate rejected for a second time the Sales Tax Amendment Bills which would have imposed a 2.5 percent tax on books, newspapers and magazines. For the LAA this comes as a great relief and also gives credence to the Association as a lobbying force. In the words of a Senator, 'The campaign against these iniquitous taxes owes much of its success to the efforts of your Association and those of the National Book Council.'

However we must not lapse into a state of slumber on this issue. In any forthcoming election the LAA must be ready to do any lobbying that might be required. All members of the LAA and in fact the whole profession, should be indebted to those members and office bearers who campaigned vigorously against this tax.

LISA leaps ahead

THE CURRENT PROGRAM of improvements being made to LISA, already one of the leading abstracting services in the field, means that subscribers will now benefit from a single service giving thorough coverage of the field.

In the past, searchers have had to consult as many as five different abstracting services to be sure of covering the library/information science field adequately. Not only is this time consuming, but it has also forced many libraries to subscribe to several overlapping services, at considerable expense.

The secret of success for any abstracting service may be defined as 'more frequent publication, better access for the user and more complete coverage of the literature'. From January 1982, LISA will be published monthly instead of bi-monthly, and each issue will also contain full name and subject indexes. This will result in an improvement in the currency of the service, and greater facility for the user.

Regular users will have noticed that LISA's coverage of library/information science literature has increased by more than 50 percent in the past two years, from 3800 abstracts in 1979 to over 6000 in 1981. US Government Reports (provided by NTIS and ERIC) have been included since 1980; more thorough coverage of monographs, conference proceedings and theses has been achieved; many of the new periodicals which have been published in this period are included.
