ACT BRANCH ustralian Federal Libraries Council

n March this year the ACT Branch set up a b-committee to further the goal of estabishing an Australian Federal Libraries Council (AFLC).

The idea of setting up a body which would o-ordinate the administrative and research vork required to enhance effectiveness and fficiency in federal government libraries, as been around since the late 1960s. In 1977 previous sub-committee produced the 'Reiew of Operations of Commonwealth De-artmental Libraries' (LAA 1977) which ecommended the creation of an independent lanning body modelled on the US Federal ibrary Committee. This report was subseuently presented and discussed with the commonwealth Public Service Board, but ith no result.

The new sub-committee has been formed take the matter up again. A discussion aper has been prepared and circulated to ederal government libraries throughout Ausalia. The response to the paper has been eartening, and many enthusiastic com-nents have been received. Unfortunately some typographical errors ccurred, and we therefore reprint the corcted paragraphs.

Library files are relatively large and almost all applications require sophisticated information retrieval software to access these files. In general, these criteria are beyond the immediate capabilities of microcomputers, however specialised functions can be implemented both at local and regional level . . If any library system is to be automated the school librarian must be confident that the computerised system will provide at least the same level of service as the previous system plus some additional benefits. (p40) . .

This paper was presented on 23 April 1980. In it, Robert Broadbent laments the fact that the harnessing of computer and communications technology for schools did not place a high priority on the ability to record and manipulate location information.

Both SAERIS and TASCIS are, in 1982, undergoing a re-examination of their priorities in this area. TASCIS is now seeking to use the feature to which I referred in May 1980 and which is mentioned on p56 of School Libraries and Technology:


