Online data analysis service

whether a new service is needed? Is it because a certain number of requests have been made for particular information? If so, then what happens when a system that provides unique capabilities becomes available, a system based on a new concept?

Librarians are the first to recognise that in the present economic environment in Australia executives are seeking cost effective procedures to help them in decision making. Up-to-date, accurate information is needed on which to base these decisions.

I.P. Users of the company's data network have access to time series on a variety of levels.

These include an accounting BETA, which is a measure of the risk involved in buying shares in a company; and the ZSCORE formula of Castagna-Matolcsy, which has been successful in the prediction of corporate failure. Daily trading statistics on the Sydney Stock Exchange are also available on this level. I.P. There are data bases on the international level ranging from information on currency exchange rates to facts on the U.S. Economic Statistics, gathered by Citibank Economics Department.
