'Libraries: after 1984' is the slogan selected for the joint LAA-NZLA Conference to be held in Brisbane next year. This is the first such conference to be held in Australia and will take place from 27-31 August 1984.

Preparations are of course well under way and already it promises to be one of the most exciting and stimulating yet. A wide range of speakers will be there, including several from overseas countries, some leading librarians and some speakers from outside the field of librarianship.

Six themes are to be covered in the programme - Information Technology, National Information Policy, Literacy, Publishing, Public Libraries and Special Collections and their Conservation. There will also be sessions before and during the conference for those delegates with special interests.

The actual exhibition will be held in the City Hall, but only Brisbane's Festival Hall is large enough for the opening ceremony of the Conference.

One promotional activity which has kept the committees very busy recently has been designing a special poster to publicise the Conference. Latest news had it that a design truly representative of the Conference slogan 'Libraries: after 1984' has now been selected and will shortly be appearing in libraries throughout Australia (and in *InCite* too of course!).

Each issue of *InCite* will bring readers more and more news of the Conference, its speakers and their subjects, to reinforce the fact that this will be an occasion not to be missed!
