# **Bob Hawke wins** again!

THE WINNER of the Braille Book of the Year Award for 1983 was Robert J. Hawke by Blanche d'Alpuget. Commenting on the winning title, Mr Lloyd O'Neil, a member of the Selection Panel, said that it was an outstanding example of the biographer's art. The sequence of events and actions were reported in a way which enabled readers to identify with the subject. The winning title was chosen late last year, the intervening period being necessary to allow the Braille and Talking Book Library to produce the book in braille and audio formats.

This is the first time in the Award's ten years that an author has won the winning citation twice - Miss d'Alpuget's Turtle Beach was Braille Book of the Year winner in 1982.

The Award itself – to take place in July is much more than the simple bestowal of a winning trophy. Approximately 200 readers from the Braille and Talking Book Library take part in a discussion of the winning title - which they have read in braille or on cassette - with the author. Such evenings in the past have been very stimulating and rewarding.

## Millionth book in ABN

THE NATIONAL LIBRARY of Austrailia is making rapid progress in transferring the records of CAVAL, the Victorian bibliographic network, to the database off the national Australian Bibliographic Nettwork (ABN).

On the weekend of May 7-8, the Library's ABN database of Australian libraries' holdings passed the one million mark when details of the 400,000th book from CAV/AL's retrospective records were entered.

The millionth book was James Wance Marshall's Walkabout, a revised version of his 1959 best-seller, *The Children*, heeld in this case by the State Library of Victoria.

CAVAL, a consortium whose acronym is derived from Co-operative Action by Wictorian Academic Libraries, operates only in its home State, but decided last year to join the nationwide ABN system. In what is lbeing called in library circles 'a retrospective conversion', the details of past book and journal acquisitions by CAVAL's members (among them libraries of the four Victorian umiversities and 15 Colleges of Advanced Education) are being transferred progressively from the CAVAL database to the ABN system. New acquisitions by CAVAL members will go directly into ABN.

ABN membership had not included Victoria until last year's 'resource sharing' agreement with CAVAL and all-round benefits include cost and labour saving; neationwide accessibility to the CAVAL records; and access, by Victorian libraries, to AlBN's details of the holdings of interstate libraries.

Increasing familiarity with ABN's operation is evidenced by the growing speedl with which details of books, old and new, are going into the system. It took membeers of the network two years to input ABN'ss first 250,000 holdings, six months for the next 250,000 and only four months for the llatest 500,000.
