## World news at your desk

A NEW service that will provide up-to-date information on virtually all major world news items, at your office desk, has been launched in Australia by Software Sciences, the software arm of THORN EMI.

Called World Reporter, the new service provides a data base of international news at the touch of a button. The information is collected by World Reporter from the text of the BBC's overseas news broadcasts, from information gathered by the BBC Monitoring Service, and from the respected British weekly, *The Economist*. Subscribers receive the material on terminals in their own offices.

Ian Walker, Software Sciences' manager-media access said that many people and organisations who need to be able to access and recall information about international events will find the World Reporter service an invaluable source of economic and political intelligence. The ease and speed with which information can be retrieved from the database will be a welcome revelation to those who have struggled with the more traditional methods in the past. It is also a lot cheaper than maintaining your own library of reference material.

Subscribers can receive the World Reporter service using simple terminals linked to computers by ordinary telephone lines or on most communication equipped mini computers. To extract material from the database, the subscriber dials up World Reporter and, using simple English instructions, obtains information in seconds. The information can be displayed on a screen or produced in hard copy form on a printer.

The three major sources of information currently available are the BBC's External Services News, the Summary of World Broadcasts, and *The Economist*. The BBC

External Services News provides 'hard' international news as a concise and factual record of world events.

The BBC's Summary of World Broadcasts gives economic, industrial, and political information broadcast from all parts of the world outside of Western Europe and North America. The BBC also listens to broadcasts in some 50 languages from 120 countries and monitors a number of foreign news agencies to bring key points of daily developments in the USSR, Eastern Europe, the Far East, Middle East, Africa and Latin America.

So far about 120,000 pages of information are available to customers and the data base is growing at the rate of 20,000 words a day. For only a modest introductory fee, subscribers can be keyed into a daily up-dated library of world events.
