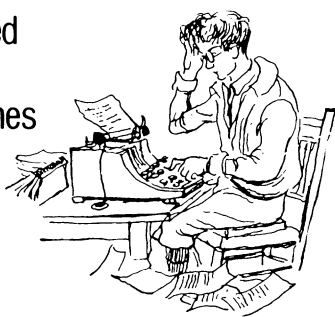

## Prolific press

The fecundity of the publisher Libraries Unlimited is clear from a recent sampling of its crops. New editions of long-serving standards, student texts, practical handbooks, biographical works.

A mixed bag, at least in their relevance to Australian reference libraries. Take *Memorable Americans*, for example. The redoubtable Robert B. Downs teams up with John T. Flanagan and Harold W. Scott in presenting 150 brief biographical sketches of the late great, from Ben Franklin to Oppenheimer. They omit 'the ephemeral, the briefly popular, the notorious'. Appendixes list the chosen ones by date of birth and by principal field of activity.

The assessments are balanced and accurate, but for the Australian user's needs a good encyclopaedia or the *Dictionary of American Biography* would do as well. But if you have US\$23.50 to spare . . . *Memorable Americans 1750-1950*, by Robert B. Downs, John T. Flanagan and Harold W. Scott, was published earlier this year by Libraries Unlimited. (ISBN 0 87287 360 9).

*Government reference books 80/81* was published last year, and is the seventh biennial volume in this series. Compiled by Walter L. Newsome, this is an annotated guide to 1433 atlases, bibliographies, catalogs, compendia, dictionaries, directories, guides, handbooks, indexes, manuals and other reference aids' issued by US Government agencies.

Citations are as full as possible, with

ISBNs, ISSNs, LC Card numbers, agency series numbers, stock numbers and Superintendent of Documents classification. There is a good author, title and subject index. This is well up to the standard of previous volumes, and is a helpful tool for libraries with major US collections or information needs. *Government reference books 80/81* was published in 1982 by Libraries Unlimited. It costs US\$37.50. (ISBN 0 87287 291 2).

*Nonprint production for students, teachers and media specialists* is a step-by-step manual offering the beginner 'information on nonprint production through a nonthreatening instructional format'. How to do storyboarding, transparency lifts and lamination, slide/tape presentations, filmstrip/tape presentations, Super-8 movies and basic video techniques are all simply explained.

It's reasonably well illustrated and has helpful references. James L. Thomas' *Nonprint production for students, teachers and media specialists* was published in 1982 by Libraries Unlimited. It costs US\$22.50. (ISBN 0 87287 337 4).

The next work will lead you to biographical information about approximately 1900 black American writers, which should help at least the 2000-plus American colleges and universities which have established Afro-American studies programmes since the 1960s.

Dorothy W. Campbell's *Index to black American writers in collective biographies* covers the obscure and the well-known figures depicted in 267 biographical works published between 1837 and 1982. Each entry provides the biographee's date(s), field of activity and references to the biographical information, right down to the page number.

It's very well done and will be useful in the largest reference collections, which is rather to state the obvious. Dorothy W. Campbell's *Index to black American writers in collective biographies* was published earlier this year by Libraries Unlimited and costs US\$27.50. (ISBN 0 87287 349 8).

The fifth sprouting in this crop is an ideas book for 'classroom and media center materials' with the promising title *Trash to treasures*. It doesn't unfortunately deal with the transmutation of metals, but with cloth-backing, laminating and dry mounting, classroom graphics, cheap storage (including a money-

saver for Tasmanian libraries, the apple-box file, presumably for those who like things in apple pie order), and some simple home-made games. An example of the latter:

### CAN OF WORMS

Cover a coffee can with construction paper and label it with 'can of worms' using a felt tipped pen. Inside, place thought-provoking questions that have been written on cut pieces of tagboard and laminated. Use this approach for review, drill, or creative oral or written expression.

This would make a useful substitute for an ALIC agenda. There are lots of other good ideas in Lee Green (remember *501 ways to use the overhead projector*) and Ann Christensen's *Trash to treasures*, published in 1982 by you know who. It costs US\$18.50. (ISBN 0 87287338 2).

Review copies of Libraries Unlimited material have been doggedly supplied by the James Bennett Group.

### The long and short of it

When it was first published in 1960, *Acronyms dictionary*, as it was then known, contained about 12,000 entries. The assiduity of its compilers and the ingenuity of acronym coiners is reflected in the eighth edition, now entitled *Acronyms, initialisms and abbreviations dictionary*, published recently by Gale Research. This edition, dated 1983-84, is in two large volumes and contains 250,000 entries or thereabouts.

It will be supplemented by two inter-edition updates, and has its customary companion volume, *Reverse acronyms, initialisms and abbreviations dictionary*. This is the most comprehensive of the several international abbreviations dictionaries currently available, although in the vast fertile field of acronyms many terms remain ungarnered.

You will search in vain for ASIO (let alone any other Australian intelligence organization), but then this work is not intended to be simply AUSTEO. For North American coverage, however, it is unsurpassed, and for international coverage generally excellent.

*Acronyms, initialisms and abbreviations dictionary*, eighth edition 1983-84, edited by Ellen T. Crowley, is published by Gale Research and costs US\$98.00. (ISBN 0 8103 0505 4; ISSN 0270-4404).

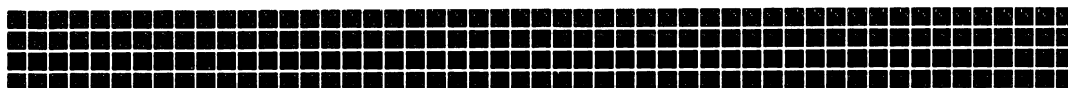

### Pluses and minuses

Now in its twelfth year of publication, *Media review digest 1982* modestly subtitles itself 'the only complete guide to reviews of non-book media'.

It contains some 40,000 citations and cross-references to reviews of films, filmstrips, educational and spoken word records and tapes, slides, kits and other miscellaneous media. There are the customary subject index, geographical index, grade level indications and review ratings (+ or - or +- or \*). It is good to see some Australian material, not only in the software listed, but in the list of periodicals indexed, although the natural North American predominance in coverage is secure.

Special features include select lists of recent film awards and prizes and an index to biographical articles on media figures. *MRD* is rounded off by a list of publishers and distributors addresses. *Media review digest 1982* is published by Pierian Press and costs US\$189.00. (ISBN 0 87650 148 X)

### Evans Head to Byron Bay

The origins of place names are often the subject of reference enquiries in libraries, and there are some good general Australian guides.

For the Richmond-Tweed Region there is now a local product, published by the Richmond-Tweed Regional Library, to provide the necessary answers. *Place names of the Richmond Region* is the first of the Place Names of Northern New South Wales Series, which should prove a most useful series in local reference libraries, judging by the present work.

When people ask why Nimbin is so named (from the Bundjalung word for 'wise-man, little-man or hobbit-cum-sage'), and who the Meldrum in Meldrum's Creek was, this little 52-page work will come to the rescue. And if you can't pronounce one of the euphonious names, guidance is given on that too.

Compiled as a joint venture between the Richmond-Tweed Regional Library and the Richmond River Historical Society, *Place names of the Richmond Region* was published earlier this year by the Richmond-Tweed Regional Library and costs \$5.00 (plus 50¢ postage within NSW, 60¢ interstate). (ISBN 0 949 459 00 3; ISBN 0 949 459 01 1 (series)).

and a closing address by Barry Jones.

Although Barry Jones seemed to be disappointed with the outcome of the conference I am not sure that some objectives were not at least, partially achieved. The general media coverage was, I thought, a little disappointing and negative in tone. Possibly this reflected the lack of sensationalism associated with such an intellectual activity (comparisons should be made with the LAA's Futures Committee). It is not surprising that more significant progress was not made when the range and diversity or represented interests is considered. That Barry Jones did not fully awaken the sleepers with his 'shock of recognition in an age of rapid technological change' is not surprising. His closing diatribe against the slow progress revealed his disappointment although, in foreshadowing a second conference in 1984, he acknowledged that the sleepers were slowly awakening.

I believe that the LAA was fortunate to receive an invitation to this conference and I hope we will be in attendance at the second conference should it be held. It was certainly a salutary experience to hear the word *information* used at least once every hour during the three days but the word *library* used only once (except for my syndicate group).

The proceedings of the Conference are to be issued shortly and will be available to members. The Minister is to be congratulated for his efforts in trying to focus attention on the problems of technology and the future and bring such diverse elements together.

# News from the Divisions

### NSW ONLINE USERS GROUP

The September meeting of the NSW Online Users Group was addressed by Malcolm Harrison, a consultant from Computer Power. Mr Harrison gave a most informative talk on the Computerised Legal Information Retrieval Service (CLIRS). A contract for the CLIRS project has been signed by Computer Power with the NSW, Victorian and Commonwealth Governments.

The aim of the CLIRS project is to provide easy, cost effective, Australia-wide, on-line access to sources of information on Commonwealth and State legislation. Status software, which is a Fortran based full text system, is being used and it is compatible with all major hardware systems. Initially access to the full text of case law records, acts, regulations and selected secondary material will be provided. Other sources of information which may be provided online in the future include land titles, probate matters, Hansard, and planning and environment decisions.

The CLIRS system will obviously be attractive to a broad range of users in fields such as accounting, legal aid, commerce, local government, union administration and legal research. Some of the problems associated with providing full text online legal information include the placement of footnotes and definitions, the contextual meaning of substantive words, the particular importance of commonly used words and referential phrases, and non-standardised forms of numbering. Although no firm decision on costing has yet been provided, it is envisaged that the approximate online cost will be \$100/hour, on a user pay principle.

#### Multi-culturalism and Libraries

The ACT Branch, in conjunction with the School Library Association of Canberra and District, is organising a Seminar on Multi-culturalism and Libraries on Friday 18th November at the Erindale Centre Conference Room. The seminar is directed towards teacher librarians and those working in public libraries but it should also interest ESL teachers, those interested in multi-cultural curricula, in teaching foreign languages and members of the public.

The seminar will take place from 2.00 pm-6.00 pm and will be followed by the official launching of *Buying books in other languages — a handbook for Australian schools and public libraries* by Anne Holmes and Derek Whitehead. Seminar participants will then adjourn to the Peking Restaurant, Phillip, for a Chinese banquet. Cost is \$30 for LAA and SLACAD members and \$35 for non-members.
