# Communications course to be broadcast

A COURSE ON Written and Spoken Communication is to be broadcast over the University of New South Wales radio station, Radio University VL2UV, starting early in March.

Dr Robert Eagleson, Associate Professor of English at Sydney University, and Chairman of the International Committee for the Teaching of English, will be the lecturer for the five-lecture course. The course will offer guidance on the collection of data and its presentation, through speech in lectures and talks or through writing in reports and articles' said Dr Eagleson. 'It is suitable for executives in all fields of activity — commercial, industrial, professional, in the public sector, for engineers, scientists and information officers.'

The course also forms part of the University of New South Wales course leading to a Graduate Diploma or Master's Degree in Human Communication.

A series of five lectures will be broadcast at 7 pm on Tuesdays and repeated at 8 pm on Wednesdays over Radio University's station VL2UV. There will also be a video session and two attended seminars held in the evening at the University of New South Wales.

Radio University transmits on 1692 kHz just off the regular broadcast band, and can be picked up in the Sydney area on a radio adjusted to receive these frequencies. Radios already modified are on sale from Radio University for \$10 including postage, or \$8 collected.

The course fee of \$20 which may be claimed as a tax deduction includes notes to complement the lectures.
