Robert D. Williamson Award goes to Neil Speirs

NEIL SPEIRS, editor and publisher of the *Australian Business Index*, has just won the 1982 Robert D. Williamson Award.

The award commemorates the late Bob Williamson and perpetuates his commitment to information systems development. The judging panel has two main criteria: to recognise outstanding contribution to the development of information science in Australia; and to encourage people with the potential to make such a contribution.

Last year's Award, to CSIRO's Jim Gilmore, recognised Jim's substantial positive

Energy Program reports available

Over \$97 million has been committed up to 1982-83 by the Commonwealth Government in the form of grants for energy research, development and demonstration under the National Energy Research, Development and Demonstration (NERD&D) Program since its inception in 1978.

Details of energy research projects funded under the Program are provided in the Compendium of Australian Energy Research, Development and Demonstration Projects. The Compendium is an annual publication which incorporates summaries of most energy R,D&D projects being undertaken in Australia. Copies of the Compendium are availinfluence on the course of information science in Australia. Speaking at the presentation ceremony for the 1982 Award, Enid Williamson made the point that Neil's enterprise in establishing the *Australian Business Index* qualified him for the prize.

The *Index*, to date 30,000 records, covers items of business, financial and economic interest published in the Australian business press. It began in 1981 and is available as a hard copy index, or as a database on AUSI-NET where it complements the index to the *Australian Financial Review*.

Neil Speirs, on the other hand, began much earlier as a copy boy on the *Sydney Morning Herald*. He progressed through finance reporter to freelance journalist and in 1973 published a book showing the exact ownership of every property in Sydney's central business district. In 1974 he similarly catalogued Melbourne's CBD.

More recently Neil found his research hindered by the lack of an up-to-date business and finance newspaper index. So he produced one – and won the Award!

Worth \$500, the Award is financed from sales of the *Recipe Book Service of Online Searching.* The *Recipe Book*, produced by Bob's widow, Enid Williamson, covers all publicly available online bibliographic and other systems, and is used as an authoritative reference by more than 200 subscribers.

Since the Program's inception seventy-four End of Grant Technical Reports on research projects have been completed by grantees.
