Microfiche Subject Catalogue for Special Libraries

The Branch has provided the Special Libraries Section with \$450 as a grant-in-aid for the production of a microfiche subject catalogue of holdings in special libraries.

Sales Tax

Concern was expressed at the sales tax now being imposed on maps, globes, etc. The Branch has written to the Government in protest and has urged Sections to do the same.

Membership Drive

A sub-committee has been formed to investigate ways of increasing membership for 1983. The members of the committee are Bill Linklater, Hans Lofgren, Rosemary Graham, and a nominee of the Medical Librarians Section. The committee would be delighted to hear any ideas on the matter.

Apropos encouraging new members, the Schools Section is planning a function for librarianship students early in 1983.

Retirement of Lois Semmens and Elaine Haworth

A joint retirement function was held for Lois Semmens and Elaine Haworth. The Branch would like to take this opportunity to thank them both for their consistent contribution to the profession and to wish them well in their retirement.

Public Libraries Funding

The public library subsidy announced in the State Budget was disappointing, especially in light of the comments made by the Minister at a meeting arranged by the Public Libraries Section on September 21 last year.

A letter requesting confirmation of the Minister's intention to restore the 50/50 level of funding was sent and an unsatisfactory re-

ply received. It is unclear how the Government intends to fulfil its promises in its 3 year term of office.

The President has written again to Race Mathews seeking an appropriate explanation. Failing a satisfactory answer Branch has agreed to write to the Premier, to the Shadow Minister for the Arts and to notify the media.

Branch Nominee for Library Courses (Vocational) Planning Committee for 1983

Carmen Hannaker is unable to continue on this committee for 1983. Margaret Findlay has agreed to attend in her place.

Council Threat to Mildura Regional Library Publications

Two popular publications produced by the Mildura Regional Library – the *Murray River Monitor* and *Community and Local Government Information Review* are under threat as the Chairman of the Regional Library Committee sees their production as inappropriate library activities and wishes to curtail their publication. Branch has written to the executive officer of the Mildura Regional Library Service asking that the publication of these serials be continued.

Branch Activities

1982 was a particularly active year for Branch functions. In the last three months alone the programme included a forum entitled 'Who Needs MARC?', a stimulating and informative discussion of the merits and flaws of ABN; a second Book House Beer Seminar, on new technology and its implications for librarians; a highly successful two-day seminar on Managing People at Work held at Ballarat and a valuable briefing session on A.V. Copyright. The year finished on an enjoyable note with Christmas Dinner at Fortuna Village.

There were also numerous section activities such as the Public Libraries Section's meeting with Race Mathews, and the national conference on the Library Workforce mounted by the Victorian Group of the Education for Librarianship Section.

1983 is already shaping up well. Planning is well underway for the AGM, and other proposed events include a visit to a bindery on

February 4; a family picnic at Wattle Park follow up seminar on women in management and a lecture or workshop by Mark Doermann speaking on ergonomics in libraries. As usual, further details of these activities will appear in 'Happenings'.

The PLS held its last meeting for 1982 on 6 December, at QIT Library. Although last of the year, it was the first for a new executive and a long list of possible activities for 1983 was discussed, including the compilation of statistics and information regarding the funding, staffing and services of public libraries to be the basis of a written submission to our funding bodies at local and State Government level. It was felt that this group could be prepared to make a strong and active stand for the continuation and improvement of a worthwhile Public Library Service Queensland.

The matter of a State Film Library emerged as a puzzling issue. Where is it? It is resolved that the group would pursue this issue.

General meetings with guest speakers, continuing education workshops and the production of kits for the geographically isolated public libraries were seen as important actions of the group. We will also be concerned with the LAA Conference '84; clearing house for library-related journal articles; newsletter; video cassettes and copyright and the continuing saga of the MOA Award restructuring of Public Library workers in Queensland.

There should be good liaison with other organizations since all the committee members of the group are involved in a wide range of library activities.

Meeting will be every 6 weeks - on Tuesday evenings at 6.00 pm at PLS, 132 Grey St, South Brisbane. Wednesday January is set for the first 1983 meeting and then March 9 and April 20.

Members and non-members are warmly in-

vited to attend meetings and since it is hoped that the group will be very active in 1983 it is planned to spread the workload of the above and other projects, so that commitment need not mean over-commitment. In this way our geographical isolation will hopefully not restrict the constructive functioning of the group as individuals will be responsible for certain activities.

All members of the committee are not only experienced librarians but are keen to try to form the direction and objective that the PLS should have in promoting, encouraging and supporting Public Libraries and Librarians in the uncertain financial times ahead.

We look forward to seeing you at our meetings or hearing from you with any thoughts on any matters.

**HUNTER REGIONAL GROUP
NSW Branch Council - LAA Hunter
Regional Group joint general
meeting.**

On 23 October 1982, a joint general meeting of the NSW Branch Council and Hunter Regional Group, took place at New Lambton Public Library, to hear about a *Study of Public Library Based Reference Services in the Hunter Valley*.

Carol Yuen, Information Services Consultant, State Library of NSW Public Libraries Division, gave a brief background and introduced two members of the consultancy team, Elizabeth and Lloyd Watson, to give the report, which was not by any means a final one but a dip into the study which gave the audience plenty of food for thought. Elizabeth outlined the stages of the study which are -

1. Socio-economic profile of the study area;
2. Demand study which consisted of field work amongst employer groups and community groups;
3. Supply study which was the library side and looked at public libraries, special and government department libraries, educational libraries;
4. Analysis phase and validation, where the study will be taken back to the librarians involved and to the community consulted.

The findings of the study are arranged into

three main areas: Demand findings; constraints - financial, institutional, political; and feasible programmes to meet demands.

Among the findings Elizabeth identified were:

- i) that there were several categories of demand on the public library e.g. a *general reference* service which included help with school homework, TAFE course material, other continuing education/University external courses; and information for *recreational* pursuits.
- ii) some criticism of public libraries in relation to ethnic material included a lack of popular and diverting material; material available often ideologically unsuitable; collections in wrong locations and not in relation to ethnic groupings.
- iii) some priorities agreed upon by both the library and the community were that more community-oriented staff and better communication were needed as well as promotion and publicity about specific areas of service.
- iv) issues raised included inter-library lending, community liaison, user fees - some users commented that they could be willing to pay for services that libraries say they cannot afford.

Recommendations of the study will have to be read in the final report.

BISA Workshop

SOME SEVENTEEN librarians from South-East Asia attended a five-day workshop on ASEAN/Australia resource sharing in information retrieval and MARC held at the University of Sydney from 16-20 August 1982.

The workshop, organised by BISA (Bibliographic Information on South-East Asia), was funded by the Australian Development Assistance Bureau (ADAB) and the National Library of Australia (NLA). It was intended to bring senior librarians from the region to Australia to discuss developments suited to resource sharing and to explore ways in which such resource sharing might be made possible.

Those attending included the national librarians of Indonesia (Mastini Hardjo-Prakoso), and Papua-New Guinea (Sir John Yocklunn) and the deputy national librarians of Malaysia (Dr Donald Wijasuriya) Singapore (Yoke-lan Wicks) and Thailand (Suwak-hon Phadungath). The director of Indonesia's National Scientific Documentation Centre (Lumarish Pringgoadisurjo) and the chief librarians of Universit Sains Malaysia (Lim Huck Tee), University of the Philippines (Filomena Tann), National University of Singapore (Wai-chee Hochstadt) and the University of Papua-New Guinea (Alan Butler) also attended, as did computer experts from the Asian Institute of Technology (Michael Sherwood) and Universit Sains Malaysia (Lim Chee Hong). Five librarians training in Australia made up the complement of overseas participants, a number of different Australian institutions were represented by librarians.
