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War & Society

A new journal, entitled *War & Society* is to be published shortly.

This new English language international journal, aims to provide a forum for the discussion of the history of war and its impact on society.

It will publish scholarly articles on the causes, experience and impact of war in all periods of history. Contributors to forthcoming issues include Reinhard Meyers (Bonn), Louis Green (Monash), André Corvisier (Sorbonne), John Whittam (Bristol) and Ronald G. Haycock (RMC Canada).

It will be published twice a year, the first issue (a complimentary one) to appear in May 1983.

Funding granted for `Teleslaq'

A CONTINUING education program for Queensland teacher-librarians has been granted \$3600 by QINSEC. *Teacher-Librarian Update 1983*, nicknamed 'TeleSLAQ', will involve a series of four interactive teleconferences with 18 Queensland centres using loudspeaker telephones to assist teacher-librarians to keep up-to-date on recent developments in education and school librarianship. The programs will contain matters of interest to many teachers as well as teacher-librarians.

This is a joint project between the School Library Association of Queensland (SLAQ) and the Department of Librarianship and Teaching Studies at the Brisbane College of Advanced Education, with support from the Library and Resource Services Branch of the Queensland Department of Education.

The main aims of the project are:

- (a) to provide inservice CE for teacherlibrarians by updating their knowledge of school librarianship through tele-conferencing which permits interaction with administrators and specialists in the field;
- (b) to bring the School Library Association of Queensland to its members, many of whom can never attend regular meetings, so that they can participate in the work of the Association and so that they can begin to take more initiative and responsibility for their own professional and inservice affairs;
- (c) to develop a model whereby any professional group can use this method effectively to unite a dispersed membership;
- (d) to practise some basic methods in distance communication which can be applied to the use of the domestic satellite which will have considerable potential for inservice through distance eduction.
