National Symposium on legal protection of computer software.

ATTENDING THE National Symposium on legal protection of computer software was like being a spectator at the opening of the photocopying or audio-visual copyright discussions. Copyright owners proclaimed that the Apple decision had undermined their property rights and placed their industry in mortal danger. Education and library representatives pointed out that the issues were much more complex and there was a danger that property rights might be asserted so exclusively as to cripple education and access to information. Anyone who has seen it all before knows that over a period negotiation under the benevolent auspices of the Attorney-General's Department will, eventually, hammer out a compromise.

However there were new elements. Lawvers pronounced their views about the legal alternatives, the choice between copyright, patent law or a special Act for computer software. There is no standard approach in overseas countries and international bodies are busy discussing the details of a possible international treaty.

Another new, and refreshing, presence was the Software Liberation group with Albert Langer calmly telling the 250-strong audience that the Seminar was like a conference of tollgate proprietors in the late 19th century claiming special protection because the tollgates were being broken down and if they were not supported no more roads would be built.

The danger for libraries is that issues concerning the status of copyright information held in computers and property rights associated with the input and output of information from computer store have got swept up into the discussion on software. Few of the international discussions have paid attention to anything except the property rights of copyright owners. Libraries will increasingly hold information in computer files or on videodisks and if the more extreme positions presently held by copyright owners were adopted, there might be a charge every time a library supplied information from these sources. Libraries might even be forbidden to make printed copies from such files for users at all.

It is worth considering whether the Software Liberation view that to apply copyright principles devised nearly 300 years ago to the different world of current information technology is a nonsense. Software Liberation claims that there are 200,000 microprocessor owners in Australia, buying, swapping and copying packaged software and as impossible

to dragoon into copyright observance as the domestic video-tape copiers. Software Liberation's proposal is to place software in the public domain and support software development, other than contractual development, from public revenue. While this may appear an extreme view, there is certainly a case for publicly funded public domain software for educational and other socially desirable purposes. It was certainly clear from the statements by the representatives from the Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee and the Education Council that the activities of their members would be crippled by a strict property rights approach to software protection. They pointed out that they spoke both as users and major creators of software.

By the end of the day it appeared that the Attorney-General's Department had received a number of useful messages. If the emergency legislation to which the government is already committed eventuates at all it is likely to be carefully modest. The discussions among interested parties, which have proved successful in reaching compromises between owners and users in other copyright areas, are likely to be used again to explore the even more difficult legal problems raised by the onrushing computer technology. These discussions are likely to include much less hasty coverage of problems of interest to libraries than might otherwise have been the case.

A copy of AACOBS' statement to the National Symposium will appear in the agenda papers for the next meeting of AACOBS Standing Committee and copies have been sent to all Standing Committee members.

- 6. Begin to prepare an oral history archive of the LAA.
- 7. Get sticker designed for 50th anniversary: to appear on LAA paper and envelopes, and posters distributed around libraries.
- 8. Money be set aside for invited guests at function. Guests to include retired serving members of Association and community leaders.
- 9. A special Australia Post commemorative envelope has been requested.
