

IN THE NEWS The Mortlock Library of South Australiana Appeal

A public appeal is being launched to help fund the most ambitious single project ever undertaken by the State Library of SA.

Demands for historical information in South Australia is booming. As public interest continues to grow, access to historical material is of paramount importance. The appeal will help establish a major new centre for this vital material . . . the Mortlock Library of South Australiana.

The original State Library Building, currently known as the Jervois Wing, is to be completely refurbished to its original Victorian dignity to house the biggest single resource centre exclusively devoted to South Australian materials. The announcement coincides with the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the State Library and the construction of the Jervois Wing.

Materials to be brought together in the Mortlock Library of South Australiana include South Australian books, pamphlets, newspapers, photographs, maps, films, tape recordings, diaries and personal papers on people, places, industries, societies, clubs, churches, schools - all aspects of life in South Australia.

The Premier Mr J. Bannon officially launched the appeal and a special display featuring a large collection of historical items from the new Library on Monday 30 April.

The aim is to raise \$500,000 by public subscription. The State Government will provide \$500,000, the Libraries Board has committed a further \$500,000 from income generated from the late J.A.T. Mortlock's bequest to the State Library. The combined revenue from these three sources will provide the \$1.5m required to establish the Mortlock Library of South Australiana.

The planned opening date of the Mortlock Library of South Australiana is April 1985.

Rare books exhibition

The Books of the People exhibition features a selection of rare and old books from the Rabbi L.A. Falk Memorial Library of the Great Synagogue.

Most items on display date from the eighteenth century. There are also some earlier pieces which are of particular interest. The oldest is a bible in four volumes, printed in Antwerp in 1566. There's also a Greek New Testament printed in 1619.

One rare item, and said to be Rabbi Falk's most treasured, is a shabby octavo published in 1650 in Amsterdam. Called The Hope of Israel, it attempts to prove that Jews were the first inhabitants of North America.

Also on display, on loan from the Mitchell Library, is a Hebrew Bible from which was read a portion of the law at the first Jewish services held in the colony of New South Wales in 1828.

The exhibition at The Great Synagogue, 166 Castlereagh Street, Sydney, will be running until August 30., 1984.
