

Awards for library design

Entries for the Library Design Awards 1984 close on 15 June.

The Award programme, conducted by the Australian Library Promotion Council and the Royal Australian Institute of Architects, aims to recognise and encourage excellence in the architectural design and planning of libraries. It is open to all libraries in Australia and New Zealand.

The Awards are sponsored by Raeco Pty Ltd., Australia's largest school and library suppliers. The president of the ALPC, Mrs Dulcie Stretton, CBE, and the acting president of the RAIA, Mr Richard Young, said in a ioint statement: 'Libraries play a crucial role in our society's educational and cultural development. It is essential that they are designed in such a way that people are encouraged to use them and benefit from the resources they contain. The Awards are an important element in our efforts to bring this perspective to library design.'

A bronze medallion will be awarded to the most outstanding library entered. In addition, up to five citations will be given for outstanding libraries entered. Submissions for awards must be received in the office of the ALPC by 5.00 pm on Friday 15 June.

The Awards announcement and presentation will take place at 5.30 pm on Tuesday 28 August during the LAA/NZLA conference in Brisbane.

Rudolph Ackermann, 1764-1834

The 150th anniversary of the death of Rudolph Ackermann - fine art printer, publisher, inventor and philanthropist - is commemorated in an exhibition now at the State Library of NSW.

A superb collection of 18th and early 19th century books, beautifully illustrated with hand-coloured aquatint engravings depicts English life of the period from tranquil scenes of the Lakes district to the rush and bustle of London.

Book productions like The Microcosm of London, The World of Miniature and the three volumes illustrating the misadventures of the elderly pedant, Dr Syntax, demonstrate the lasting beauty of Ackermann's publishing achievements.

His finest publications are his illustrated topographical works, especially the histories of Westminster Abbey, the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge and the Public Schools, described in his obituary in The Gentleman's Magazine 30 March, 1834, as 'monuments of his spirit and taste'.

A man of many parts, Rudolph Ackermann also designed Lord Nelson's funeral car in 1805, pioneered the use of gas lighting and developed a moveable axle, forerunner of that used in motor cars today.

Rudolph Ackermann, 1764-1834 'A Man of Spirit and Taste' is on display in the Galleries, 1st floor State Library of NSW until 8 July, 1984.

Australian standards on microfiche

A new service now available provides the complete file of Australian Standards, Codes of Practice, Manuals and Handbooks on microfiche.

It is available to clients by annual subscription and includes monthly updating and provision of a fiche reader and workstation with integrated panel stand.

The service has been introduced to assist organisations who need to maintain complete sets of standards but are deterred by a lack of storage space, the constant problem of inserting updates and the initial cost of buying hardcopy standards.
