Children and reading

'Where have all the flowers gone?' was a memorable question of a popular song of the sixties. Today the question on the minds of librarians is: 'where have all the children gone?

Declining interest in reading for leisure, particularly in the 10-12 years range, has prompted a group of concerned people to organise a seminar entitled 'does it matter what children read? does it matter if they read?'

Convened by the Library Board of Western Australia in association with several interest groups, the seminar will explore the way in which reading is presented in homes, schools and public libraries; the influence of television programmes, TV games and home computers; the role of sub-literature such as comics, magazines and newspapers; and practicalities of reading encouragement.

Master of Arts (Library Science) at Kuring-Gai

From Semester 1 1985, the School of Library and Information Studies will be offering a Master of Arts degree in Library Science — a course which will cater for people already professionally qualified in library or information science, with at least three years experience in librarianship, archives or information science at a professional level.

The programme will consist of three main areas: a Major Study (Library and Information Studies); two supporting Studies (Research Design and Methods and The Learning Process and Curriculum Design); and a Research Project. It is directed at people who wish to ake advanced study in relation to a concepcual of Library Science and its development as a field of study.

Learning sessions will involve independent earning, individual consultations, group oresentations and discussions.

Full-time students will be able to complete the course in 2 years (four semesters); parttime students in 3½ years (seven semesters).

The latest edition of The Good Book Guide to Children's Books has recently been released.

The first edition was a great success and over 50,000 copies were sold in 175 countries. This publication acts as a key reference book to children's books and is a reliable guide to good books currently in print for children up to 14 years of age. The authors have been invited to address the Children's Literature Section of the Modern Language Association of America this December, in Washington D.C.

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
The Centre for Library Studies is sponsoring an introductory workshop which will be of use to those who wish to gain familiarity in the use of on line terminals
