PYEPUB

Steven Zegelin and Julianna Wong of the Division of Environmental Mechanics, CSIRO, Canberra, have developed computer software for searching, sorting and listing the Division's reference material.

The software, known locally as PYEPUB, is designed to efficiently access a relatively small (10,000 entries), in-house, scientific data base consisting of a list of Divisional publications (600), library books held in the Division (1000) and an external reprint collection (8000).

It can search by author, title, publication year, journal, call number, keyword, or location and produce the listing on a variety of devices. PYEPUB is written in BASIC for operation on a VAX computer; however, it could easily be adapted to run on other machines.

Assistance for disabled people

News has come in of two new publications which will be of assistance to disabled people.

Report of Library Services to Disabled Persons in New South Wales 1983 has been prepared by the Public Libraries Division, State Library of NSW, Level 8, 8-18 Bent Street, Sydney 2000, from whom it is available free of charge. This is a report on a survey carried but late last year by Valerie Moon for the NSW Working Party of Library Services to the Disabled.

From Victoria comes a publication entitled Income, allowance, subsidies and concessions for disabled persons: a resource listing for Victoria. The title tells all except that it includes more than eighty different types of concessions etc. The cost is \$6.50 and it is available from the Yooralla Society of Victoria, PO Box 88, South Melbourne 3205.

Mobile Library online

The Peninsula Regional Library Service has reported on their successful test programme with online terminals on their mobile library.

After the installation of a Libs 100 computer system at their headquarters it was felt that there would be a great advantage in linking the mobile library as well as branches to the nain computer.
