News from the Divisions

SA BRANCH

Each year the South Australian Branch of the LAA arranges a visit to a country area. This year the venue was Keith, in the upper southeast region, where a new school/community library was opened only a few weeks before the visit on Sunday, September 30 and Monday, October 1.

As participants had to travel long distances to attend, an overnight stay was essential. Consequently the program was designed to begin on Sunday afternoon and to conclude by 3:00 p.m. on Monday. All school and public libraries were told of the conference and asked to indicate which topics they would like included. The preferences were for management skills and adolescent literature, and the organizing committee of Joan Brewer (Branch Councillor), Pam O'Donnell (President, Public Libraries Section) and Lawrie Whitmore (President, School Libraries Section) drew up a program with these needs in mind.

The first session began at 2:30 when Gerrie Stafford, the Branch President, talked about the objectives and activities of the Library Association, showed the variety of publications issued, and explained the lobbying activities of the Association, particularly the success in relation to federal funding for school libraries and proposed activities in relation to funding for public libraries.

Joan Brewer discussed some of the issues on the agenda at the last General Council meeting. Later Pam O'Donnell conducted a session in which groups of three were set up, with each person required to speak to the other group members on a specified management topic. After three topics had been discussed the groups changed, allowing people to talk to everyone present.

In the evening members visited Carolyn Bullen's home, on a farm about 48 kilometres from Keith, for a barbecue.

Monday morning's session began with Anne Simpson talking about new titles in adoles-

cent fiction. She provided a number of lists and had borrowed some books from Adelaide booksellers for display. Maureen Nimon followed with a short session on science fiction and then there was group discussion.

The next session was introduced by brief talks on communication in management by Pam O'Donnell, Felicity Langeveldt and Joan Brewer. This was followed by small group discussion of case studies. The conference ended at 3:00 pm

The visit was voted a great success by the twenty-four librarians from the south-east who drove such long distances to attend. There were librarians from public libraries, school libraries and school/community libraries. The eight SA Branch members also appreciated the opportunity to meet their country colleagues. Those who attended were Gerrie Stafford, Flinders University and Branch President; Maureen Nimon, SACAE and Branch Vice-President; Joan Brewer, SACAE and Branch Councillor; Pam O'Donnell, Public Libraries Division and President of Public Libraries Section (S.A.); Felicity Langeveldt, Librarian Tea Tree Gully Public Library; Anne Simpson, SACAE; Margaret Day, Public Libraries Division; and Euan Miller, State Librarian.

The South Australian Branch looks forward to another successful country visit in 1985.
