Council found the review process useful and has asked the Executive Director to consider any further measures needed to ensure committees are active and productive. (GC 272/84) It has also asked the Industrial Information and Research Officer to prepare a position paper on the progress of standards for particular types of libraries, and present proposals for revision where appropriate. (GC 273/84)

1984 Biennial Conference

The report of the Brisbane Conference Committee was tabled. Although accounts are not yet complete a healthy profit is expected. Council thanked the Committee for its work in organising a most successful conference (GC 276/84) and Christine Crocker for her liaison role with Council. (GC 277/84)

1986 Biennial Conference

Expressions of interest in the position of organiser of the Darwin conference have been received and a decision is to be made shortly. The Conference Committee has proposed three principal overseas speakers, and Council has agreed to invitations being extended to them. (GC 280/84). Details will be published when acceptances have been received.

1988 Biennial Conference and IFLA

The 1988 Biennial Conference is to be held at the University of NSW, from 27 to 30 August, and an Australian theme and speakers are proposed. A joint steering committee for the two conferences has been established, and appointment of a joint organiser is seen as a priority. (GC 282/84) Planning for the conferences will be able to proceed more rapidly once IFLA has agreed to a format for its conference, and potential sponsors are identified.

Council has unanimously endorsed an Executive Committee recommendation that as a matter of policy and subject to the availability of funding the Executive Director attend and represent the Association at annual IFLA conferences. (GC 285/84)

International relations

- The International Relations Committee is preparing a statement on international relations for Council's consideration at its March meeting. (GC 284/84)
- John Brudenall represented the Association at the 1984 IFLA Conference in Nairobi and has reported on a number of issues related to broadening LAA involvement in IFLA, and to the hosting of the 1988 conference. The Executive Director is to visit IFLA prior to her annual leave in December, and she and Mr Brudenall will develop his proposals further for Council. (GC 286/84)

LAA House

Software for the new membership database is almost finished, and it is hoped that it will be operating in time for processing 1985 membership renewals. Disk capacity on the new system has proved too small for all functions to run concurrently, and the Executive Committee has authorised purchase of additional disk space. (GC 287/84) Air-conditioning has been installed in LAA House. Replacement of the windows and exterior painting are now the only major renovations to be completed.
