

LAA Study Grant Awards for 1986

THE LIBRARY Association of Australia will make funds available each year to support practising librarians wishing to undertake a study project. The number of awards in any year will depend upon the funds available and the estimated costs of proposals received.

The Association's intention in offering study grants is to provide an opportunity for librarians to undertake projects they would otherwise be unable to do because of the time and costs involved.

Conditions

- Available to a practising librarian in a supervisory or middle management position, with a minimum of three years' experience in library and information work.
- For the purpose of undertaking a study program on a selected library/information issue or problem of present and future relevance to the development and improvement of library and information services in Australia.
- The study may include opportunity for preliminary work, local or overseas visits/consultations, attachment to another organisation, preparation of a publication, further educational qualification.
- The study is to culminate in a written report in two parts, provided to the Association. The first is a chronological summary of the project components together with a statement of the value derived, provided within one month of the project's culmination. The second component is a comprehensive report provided within four months of the project's culmination.
- It is expected that the study project will provide an opportunity for self development as well as benefit to the successful applicant's institution and present position.
- The award is not intended to be used to fund research projects.

- Applicants should complete an application form which gives:
 - A brief description of the study project, including aims; benefits to the individual and to the institution; possible outcomes of a project.
 - Identification and reasons for choice of particular institutions, persons or activities.
 - Itinerary, timetable, travel/accommodation costs involved.
 - Details of any other funds or facilities being provided for the study project.
 - A curriculum vitae.
 - 2 referees' reports.
- Applicants must be financial members of the LAA.

About ACPAD

The Australian Centre for Publications Acquired for Development (ACPAD) collects books, journals and other publications, preferably in English, for distribution to universities and institutions for higher education in developing countries.

Funds are provided by the Australian Development Assistance Bureau, (ADAB) through the International Development Program of Australian Universities and Colleges Ltd. (IDP). This enables ACPAD to meet the costs, where necessary, of sorting, listing, shipping and entry.

Publications donated by tertiary institutions, business houses and libraries now form part of collections in university and higher education libraries in Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Thailand, Fiji and Papua New Guinea.

Growing numbers of institutions in developing countries are showing increasing interest in the scheme, underlining the urgent need for more donations.

What to donate

From individuals and libraries — Scholarly books, reference material, journals (current and back sets), serials for which annual cumulations are received and paper copies of publications converted to microform.

Priority areas to date have been food and agriculture, science, medicine, education, economics, engineering, and English as a second language, but materials in all disciplines are needed.

NBC LAUNCHES NATIONAL WRITERS' TOURS

During 1985 the National Book Council will launch a program of Writers' Tours to take authors into communities throughout Australia to give readings and informal talks about literature.

All States can now participate in tours modelled on the successful pilot 'Meet the Author' program in Victoria. Award-winning writers, Dimitris Tsaloumas and Olga Masters, travelled from Warragul to Hamilton, Mildura, Bendigo and Benalla, giving local people the opportunity to hear them read and talk about writing.

The Literature Board has funded the scheme under the Australia Council's Touring and Access Program, established to take the arts into remote areas. Mary Lord, Director of the NBC, invites any regional organisation — book clubs or literary societies, schools, service organisations, libraries, arts groups and institutions — interested in bringing writers and readers together, to contact her about the tours' itineraries. The range of potential activities is broad and depends on the needs of the local community.

Tom Shapcott, Director of the Literature Board, said the Literature Board is keen to take advantage of this initiative as a major step towards re-establishing a national touring network of the kind operating in the 1960s.
