Australian Young Writers' Project

1985 has been declared International Youth Year by the United Nations and Australia is in the forefront of promoting the interests of youth; the Australian Young Writers' Project is intended to encourage their creativity.

The International Youth Year National Secretariat, Penguin Books Australia, The Literature Board of the Australia Council and the ABC have combined efforts to create a national award open to everyone under the age of 25 to write short stories, poems or scripts to become part of three separate media projects.

Penguin Books will publish a selection of successful entries as an anthology. ABC Radio will adapt successful submissions into radio plays. ABC Television will convert as many as five of the successful stories into half hour television dramas.

The three principal thrusts of IYY are participation, development and peace and it is loosely around these three themes that entries should be focused.

The Australian Young Writers' Project is the first major event of this nature to be launched for International Youth Year. It is hoped that it will form the basis for a continuing programme, the spirit of International Youth Year being seen as the beginning and not the end of such activities.

The occasion was very well attended and Don Watts, the Director of WAIT thanked the three librarians for their outstanding contribution to the profession. 12 July


FILMS AVAILABLE

The Sydney Filmmakers Co-op has added two short Australian narrative films, *Stations* and *Devrim*, to its collection. Stations, starring Noni Hazelhurst, is an award-winning film by Jackie McKimmie and one of the few films to show with a feature in a mainstream cinema, accompanying acclaimed Australian film *Careful He Might Hear You* during its season.

Devrim is about a young Turkish woman who finds herself in an impossible marriage. This film explores her dilemmas, her conditioning both as a migrant and as a woman, and looks at how she eventually deals with these. Devrim is told from a migrant woman's perspective having been written, produced and directed by the Migrant Women's Film Group and is the first film of its kind.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

Membership of the Board of Education is as follows:

- three professional members elected by the Professional Committee of General Council;
- seven members, of whom at least four must be professional members, elected by the membership-at-large of the Association;
- the President of the Association ex officio;
- the Executive Director as a non-voting executive member. (By-law 24)
