SPECIAL LIBRARIES SECTION, SA

Continuing education:

The outstanding success of CE activities for 1984 was the ABN seminar conducted as a joint venture with the Cataloguers' Section. The limited number of places were soon filled and a waiting list of more than twenty people was formed. Fortunately, with plans in hand for another session, W. Cathro from ABN notified the section of his intention to visit SA and a second session of ABN, organised in a very short time, was attended by more than thirty librarians.

At a seminar in May speakers from Bennett Ebsco, DA Books, Mannings and H. Coxon spoke on Government publications and provided valuable insights into problems of supplying periodicals and other library materials.

Visits:

Our thanks are recorded to J. Powditch and G. Ralph for allowing us to visit the Art Gallery and the Wilmar library respectively. Both visits were relatively well attended and quite unique. We don't often have to be tagged and recorded to enter a library, as was the case with the Art Gallery and it is a rare opportunity to be able to attend the opening of a new, private library.

Lunches:

Irene Doskatsch organised a series of lunches at a variety of venues and we hope that lunches will continue to be a feature of the Specials calendar. As she is not continuing on the committee in 1985, we would like to thank Irene for the many social functions that she has organised.

Lobbying:

An important activity of the committee this year has been a representation to the South

Australian Library Advisory Committee (SALAC) for a representative of special librarians to be involved in that committee. A written submission was supplemented by the personal representation of E. Heinrich at a recent meeting of SALAC. As yet no response has been received.

It was interesting to note that the minutes of the General Council of the LAA at their meeting prior to the Brisbane conference involved items upon which this section had made representations - perhaps most notably the question of voucher only membership of the LAA. As a result of individual and group lobbying from our Committee and other Specials Committees, a voucher only category has been created for which all libraries are eligible, regardless of their budget. We hope that any librarians who have dropped their personal membership of the LAA in favour of the old institutional membership will continue to support their association by resuming their personal memberships. There are a great number of drafts requiring comment received from the central office of the LAA and this committee has been quite active in promoting the interests of special librarians in this state despite the short period of time allowed for such comments.

Many of these issues are discussed at Forum meetings organised through the SA Branch Committee. While the Specials Committee comprises a range of opinions which are presented on behalf of our section, members of the Section are reminded that their views may also be put at these meetings which are professionally informative and emphasise the high level of activity in the LAA.


