CANBERRA PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICE

On the occasion of the presentation of the Commonwealth Budget for 1985/86, the Minister for Territories, Mr Gordon Scholes, said the Canberra Public Library Service will receive an extra \$167,000 (total \$1,117,000) in its budget allocation for 1985/86. This represents a 17.5% increase on 1984/85, when it received \$950,000.

Increase in funds for book stocks

The provision for a new and wider range of library materials will be about \$530,000, an increase of 29%. This increase reflects one of the major recommendations of the Flowers Report. Annual expenditure per head of population on new publications will rise over \$2 compared with \$1.64 per head in 1984/85.

These additional expenditures will ensure that Canberra's library services are maintained at a high standard.

Permanent Central Library building in Civic Centre

Design of a permanent Central Library building for the Canberra Public Library Service in Civic Centre will commence in 1985/86.

The permanent building was a key recommendation in the Flowers Report. The present Central Library is housed in temporary accommodation in Kingston, and is inadequate to meet increasing demands. A new Central Library would house the major public collections, facilities for the central administration, and technical services.
