Earthquake in Mexico: appeal for help

The catastrophe which struck Mexico last week must — without doubt — have hit also libraries and librarians badly. The profession in Mexico had already a hard time in coping with high inflation. Insufficient tools and manpower hampered the service to the users, notwithstanding the dedication of our colleagues. This rather dismal picture has now been turned into a real disaster

As Secretary General of IFLA I make a strong personal appeal to translate your feelings of sympathy into concrete financial support. IFLA is looking forward to receive your contributions by cheque or by a payment into IFLA's bank account. Please state clearly with your transfer 'SOS: Mexico'.

The money will be put at the disposal of the Mexican Library Association or — in consultation with the Mexican LA — be earmarked by IFLA for special actions for the support of Mexican libraries and librarianship. A detailed account of the receipts will be given in IFLA Journal 1986 no. 1.

South Australian Workers Compensation System changes

The South Australian Government has released details of a new system called Work Cover which aims to reduce delays in contesting workers' compensation claims, ensure the implementation of safer work practices, allow the earlier return to the workforce of injured people and to improve benefits for injured workers and their families.

A new Workers' Rehabilitation and Compensation Corporation will be established which will be given wide powers to adopt rehabilitation programmes.
