

Fundraising for Women's Art Register

An appeal to raise money to ensure perma nent funding for the Women's Art Registe was started in Melbourne recently.

A comprehensive national record of th works of Australian women artists from 185 to the present day, the Register has been i existence for 10 years. Despite very little putlicity, the Register is regarded by artists aneducationalists as being of national significance and an important record of our artisti heritage.

Having received generous funding at it establishment, the Register has since then have to rely largely on small amounts of year-tc year funding from Federal and State govern ment bodies and other sources, the voluntar labour of artist/co-ordinator Erica McGilchrist and the goodwill of a small municipal publi library.

The Australia Council (until now a regula funder) recently announced that its own bud getary problems prevent it from contributin any more monies for Register salaries. Th Register has responded by starting a search fo permanent and ongoing funding from othe sources. They are seeking:

- Donations from interested individuals and corporations. (Donations are tax deductible.
- Sponsorship by business organisations which would benefit by having their namattached to the Register and thereby gain national exposure as being supportive of the preservation of a significant part of ou artistic history.

The amount needed is \$35,000 per year. The Register aims to raise that amount as well a the amount of \$500,000 over a 10-year perior so that a Trust can be established to provid the necessary income.

TRANSPORT GOES ONLINE

The Australian Railway and Research Development Organisation has joined ABN giving research staff within the Organisation and in State transport authorities and similar national bodies access to one of the country's largest catalogues of library material.

The Australian Railway Research and Development Organisation is one of 12 libraries to join the Network recently and will be one of a number of other specialist libraries that make up 45 per cent of the ABN membership providing cataloguing information to the Network. The Organisation's contribution will include more than 2000 items on transportation research, particularly in railway operations and marketing, and, to a lesser extent, road research.

The ABN database will also give the Organisation access to almost four million citations for books, journals, films, maps and other types of library material held in Australian libraries, and to the locations of three million entries of research material.
