SCHOOLS SECTION (SA)

Check it out!

A literature-based approach to the teaching of reading which encourages the use of a wide range of material has been adopted in many Australian schools in recent years. While this method is more enjoyable and effective than phonics, look and say, basal reading schemes etc, it places a great strain upon teachers and librarians who rack their brains to find suitable books.

Early in 1984, the Schools Section in South Australia decided to make its major task for the year the production of a series of annotated bibliographies of fiction for use in literature-based reading programmes. *Check it out!* is the result. At the beginning of the project, four working groups were set up, each responsible for looking at the material available for a particular age group, selecting the best 150-200 titles in a number of categories, e.g. humour, fantasy, traditional literature, family stories, and assembling the final bibliography.

The first two bibliographies of junior primary (ages 5-7) and middle primary (8-10), were launched in January by LAA SA Branch President, Maureen Nimon, at the annual Children's Literature Summer School. The other parts, upper primary (11-13) and secondary (13+), will be published early this year. The annotations are brief and practically oriented, in keeping with the bibliographies' aim, i.e. to provide helpful ideas for classroom teachers and teacher-librarians who are struggling to keep up a supply of exciting, high quality books for their reading programme.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES SECTION, NSW GROUP

Members were treated to a lively introduction to the library by Anna Hallett, and a tour which included a specially mounted display of some of the Collection's rarer items, including a copy of Erasmus Darwin's *The Loves of the Plants*, a botanical treatise entirely in voluptuous rhyming couplets.

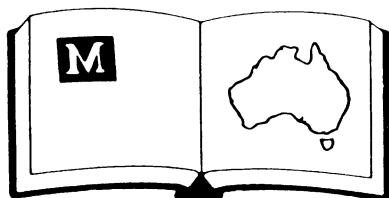
Dr Blake said the Institute was confident of providing a whole new range of educational opportunities for southern NSW and northern Victoria.

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
