
## South Australian library opens

Three hundred and fifty guests assembled r the opening by H.E. The Governor of outh Australia, Lt Gen Sir Donald Dunstan, BE, CB3. Most were donors to a public appeal at raissed over \$300,000 towards the \$1.5 illion refurbishment of the 102-year-old ervois Wing of the State Library, which oused tthe first free public library service in outh Auustralia.

The Mlortlock Library of South Australiana orms am enduring contribution to the State's ibilee 150 celebrations, holding as it does, e largest and most comprehensive collecon of information on all aspects of life in outh Australia. Its huge diversity of historial materials includes posters, periodicals, ewspapers, photographs and films, as well as ound recordings and papers on people, aces, iindustries, societies, clubs, churches nd schools.

In addition to nineteenth century treasures ich as the personal papers of Colonel Light he founder of Adelaide), and George Fife ngas, it holds a comprehensive collection of emoraibilia of Sir Donald Bradman. Not only is papeers, but also the bats, balls, stumps and ophies; marking his many triumphs.

The Mortlock Library is named in recogtion of John Andrew Tennant Mortlock, a ealthy pastoralist from the State's midnorth, who provided a \$3 million bequest to the State Library of South Australia in 1980.

State Librarian Mr Euan Miller said that the building itself has stood the test of time surprisingly well and all the original shelving, readers' tables and chairs, as well as the enquiries desk were able to be restored.

Much of the cost of the present project was in providing ideal climatic controls and a fire repressant system that ensures the best possible environment for paper preservation. This was a complex task because of the size of the main chamber, the overhanging balconies and the myriad of small rooms and alcoves in the building.

A mellow sandstone has been used for the building's exterior, with similar earthy colours inside. The rich cedar browns of the shelving blend with muted tones on the walls and the deep red inlaid leather-topped tables. The wrought iron on the balconies is highlighted in gold leaf.

As well as raising a substantial sum of money the public appeal brought forth considerable donations of private archival material. The Appeal committee used a number of novel ideas to raise funds. As well as approaches to companies with significant investment in South Australia, members of the public were encouraged to donate their first dollar coin, a period ball was held in the library itself, and school children throughout the State signed a commemorative book now displayed in the Mortlock Library. Inscribed plaques on bays in the main chamber or on some of the public rooms in the building record major donors.
