fascinating collection which includes drawigs, photographs, diaries, school reports and tters dating from 1915, has been donated to the State Library of NSW. These are the papers I novelist Eleanor Dark who died last year.

There are fifteen boxes in the collection hich traces Eleanor Dark's life and development as a writer.

Eleanor Dark led a quietly radical family life s the daughter of Labor politician and writer, owell O'Reilly, who introduced the first bill or women's suffrage in the NSW Legislative ssembly, and later the wife of socialist Dr ric Dark, driven from Katoomba, NSW, as a ommunist sympathiser during World War II.

Eleanor Dark is probably best known for her rilogy *The Timeless Land* (1941) which told ne story of white settlement in Australia. It as made into a successful television series for ne ABC a few years ago.

After their marriage in 1922 Eleanor and ric Dark moved to Katoomba, where she bean her first novel *Slow Dawning*, published a London in 1932.



Apart from some time living in Queensland the 1950s, Katoomba remained Eleanor ark's home thoughout her life. Her study /aruna' is shown in the photograph.

She wrote ten novels in all, a number of nort stories and poems, which she wrote nder the pseudonym of Patricia O'Rane.

Eleanor Dark was a very private person, and nis collection provides for the first time a limpse into the life of this accomplished riter.



MARC + ISO/OSI = COMMUNICATIONS is an equation that represents a dream of librarians since the beginning of library automation.

Any dream is a mixture of reality and fantasy. In this dream, the reality is MARC — and the illusive fantasy was standard communication protocols that could transfer MARC records from institution to institution.
