



Lack of support

TRIAD launched LIST (its monthly current awareness journal of library and information science) twelve months ago. Our experience has shown that we held an idealistic and mistaken view that library and information professionals practice what they preach, viz that keeping up to date with current develop-

ments in one's own professional area is important. Lamentably, this has proved not to be so.

Consequently, TRIAD is now ceasing to publish LIST, citing the following perceived reasons for its failure:

- 1. lack of subscribers
- 2. lack of co-operation from approximately one third of the publishers of journals or newsletters in Australian library and information science.

Overwhelmingly, however, the lack of support from the profession has been the cause of LIST's demise — an indictment of our profession in this country.

Laurie Brown to retire

Tasmania's State Librarian, Laurie Brown, is to retire on July 11. He says it is time for him to make way for a younger State Librarian.

After a career that has spanned 39 years, Mr Brown feels that it is appropriate that he retires now as the State Library has recently acquired a new Libraries Act, a new library Board and a new Minister.

His retirement comes at a time when restructuring of public library services in Tasmania seems likely to be achieved through a

review of services currently being conducted by the Tasmanian Library Advisory Board.

Tasmanian Minister in charge of Libraries, Peter Rae, said that the Government is very sorry to lose the expertise of such an experienced individual who has made a significant contribution to the development of Tasmania's library services.

He commended Laurie Brown's work to maintain and expand library services in Tasmania and said that this has ensured that Tasmanian public library services are recognised as being among the best in Australia. Laurie Brown is regarded throughout Australasia as a leading figure in librarianship.
