Not before time? There will be no Presidential Address, thereby freeing time for Council's report on the Corporate Plan. Members wishing to share the President's thoughts on the state of the bibliographic nation will be catered for through the Conference Programme.

Immediately after the Conference the President goes on four weeks holiday in deepest Arnhem Land, so the next three *InCite* columns will be coming to you from Peter Dawe, your leader next year.

To close, a couple of reminders. Try to make it to the AGM to make the AGM what we all want it to be. And what better way to finish the same day than at the President's Sunset Cocktail Party, starting at 6?

Dr Borchardt was formerly Chief Libraria at La Trobe university and shortly before be retirement the university named its libra after him.


