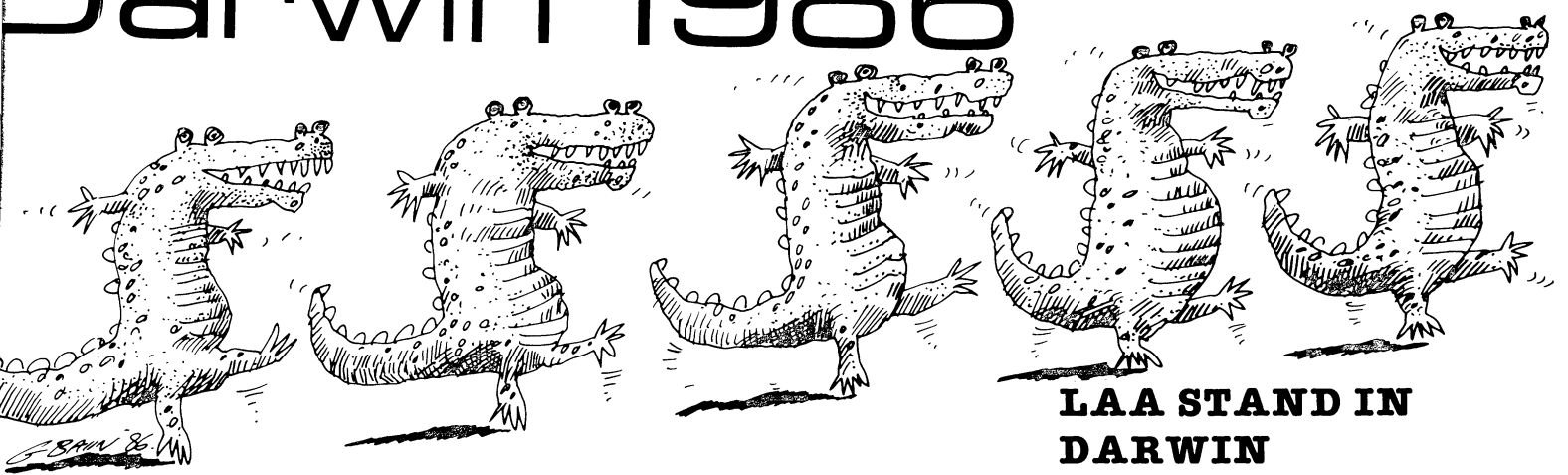

Speaker Profiles

When we are informed when we have information? This is the question Professor Dr Helmut Grünewald will be addressing in his keynote address on Tuesday 1 July.

Born in Germany in 1930, Dr Grünewald studied chemistry at the University of Bonn and then completed his PhD while he was a student at Cornell Medical College, New York. In 1968 he was appointed Director of Publications at the German Chemical Society, a position he still holds today. Dr Grünewald became an Honorary Professor for chemical literature, documentation and nomenclature at the University of Bonn in 1983.

Dr Grünewald believes that information is one of the most inflationary currencies of today. The term is sufficiently vague to be used in almost any context, to become part of death-taking composites (as in 'information society') or to be amalgamated with every disassemblable bit of language (as in 'informatics'). Although many feel plagued by the 'information flood', all that seems to be known about the disease is that it can be reduced to patterns of zeros and ones which may be shifted, combined and output with incredible speed suitably channelling the flow of electrons. Every effort has been made to understand the nature of the merchandise. In this respect, Dr Grünewald will offer a number of curative considerations.

Dr Jocelyne Scutt is well qualified to examine the librarian's role in social, political and legal change, which is the title of her keynote session also scheduled for Tuesday 1 July. Dr Scutt is Deputy Chairperson, Law Reform Commission, Victoria. She is also the author of various books including *For richer, for poorer: money, marriage and property rights*; *Rape law reform*; *Even in the best of homes: violence in the family*; and *Poor nation of the Pacific: Australia's future?*

According to Dr Scutt, law reform proposals for social change should not be carried out or put forward in a historical or contextual vacuum. To be effective, those proposing changes in laws, behaviour and/or attitudes must be able to work together with a librarian or librarians attuned to the present legal, social and political system and aware of resources and materials of present and past that may be valuable to reformers. Librarians who are lateral thinkers are a boon to law reformers and others working in areas of social and political change. Dr Scutt will examine the reasons why this awareness is necessary and how it can be developed, built upon and incorporated into law reform.
