The guest speaker was Dr Lionel Gilbert, writer and historian who spoke on the topic 'Some thoughts about books and those who look after them'. Dr Gilbert was, until his retirement, Deputy Principal of the Armidale College of Advanced Education and Director of the New England Historical Resources Centre.



INMAGIC demo

On Thursday 8 May, the Special Librarie Group in Tasmania held its monthly meetin at the Library in Transport Tasmania. Host fo the evening was Bert Elson, Transport's In formation Officer, who had arranged a dem onstration of the INMAGIC software packag he is using to develop an extremely flexibl information system for his users.

Speaking to a packed audience Bert out lined how he acquired his micro and softwar package late in 1985. It was one of those case where there was money to be spent, an hardly any time in which to do it. Bert wa given just two weeks to choose and bu everything. While such a task would hav daunted most librarians, Bert merely shifte into higher gear and met his deadline. The d ϵ cision on what software package best suite his needs came down in favour of INMAGIC.

And if you think such a speedy decisio might have left him with a heap of problems forget it. Several months later Bert is sti waxing enthusiastic about his acquisitions an one evening was hardly enough for him t demonstrate what he is doing and to answe the numerous questions thrown at him.

Like a lot of special libraries and informa tion centres, the library at Transport Tas mania deals with a great variety of information, much of which does not fit int conventional library classification schemes Bert has found INMAGIC to be extremely eff cient in managing and retrieving the mor awkward types of information he deals with as well as standard items such as mone graphs, serials, etc. Some of the features $\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}$ INMAGIC: variable length fields; user define data structures and report formats; keywor or term indexing on any field; use of Boolea operators to connect, expand or limit searc requests; no limit on the number of records i a database; and a flexible report generato These allow the special librarian to design an create their own forms for inputting informa tion, extreme flexibility in retrieving infor mation and the ability to produce snapp looking acquisitions lists or library bulletin from the existing database records.

The evening was such a success that we wi be organising another meeting later in th year, based on a practical demonstration c using both micros and word processors in th library environment.

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
