#### Welcome return

People who have given up using Sally Wynkoop's *Subject guide to government reference books*, which appeared as long ago as 1972, can now reach for its successor.

Judith Schiek Robinson's *Subject guide to* U.S. Government reference books, published by Libraries Unlimited in 1985, is a welcome, complete revision of Wynkoop's work. It offers, like its predecessor, selective coverage of publications (including non-book materials) emanating from the United States Government departments and agencies.

The 1,324 entries are well-arranged and well-annotated. There is an excellent name, title and subject index. There is also a brief, but useful three-page guide to how to obtain any of the items listed. Scanning this excellent guide I wonder, as I often do, if there is some Australian 'Robinson' lurking somewhere, about to provide the same right royal treatment for the wealth of Commonwealth reference materials.



It's hard not to like three Australian contributions to the 'Animals in the Wild' series from local publisher John Ferguson. All three are by Vincent Serventy, who provided all the text and many of the colour photographs, which are excellent. The books in this series should appeal to children of primary school age, and of course they can also be read to younger naturophiles.




### The fertile Far North

A bright cover and some excellent book design distinguish *Visarts 85: a guide to visual arts on the Far North Coast NSW*, which was published last year by the Richmond-Tweed Regional Library.

The project, of which this is the culmination, was an ambitious one: to record information on artists and craftpersons in the area from Coffs Harbour to the Queensland border and west to Bonalbo. An amazing variety of talent is represented, including knifemaking, puppetry, batik, whipmaking, beadwork and blacksmithing. There are illustrations of some of the artists' work, and of some of the artists themselves, and a supplement of names and address of clubs, societies, galleries, courses and competitions in the area.
